Well Known Durham Citizen Dies on Sunday

DAVID BLAIN MACFARLANE

On Sunday evening, Sept. 1st, the hand of Death entered the home of David Blain MacFarlane (Allan) and robbed that home of husband and father. He became suddenly ill Thursday night with acute stomach trouble, but a fatal ending was not dreamed of, hence the magnitude of the shock to close relatives and friends. Mrs MacFarlane had been holidaying in and near Detroit, and reached home Saturday evening, and found her husband quite bright and cheerful. But it was not to be, and one of the best known citizens of this district has joined the Great Majority.

"Allan" is a pure product of Durham, and most of his years have been spent in and around town. Before leaving Durham, he learned the tailoring with the late A. D. MacKenzie, and later the cutting in Chicago. Later he came back with the trade, who was then at Mine Centre, Rainy River District. He worked for Raven Lake cement plant in Chicago, in 1893, worked on an exhibit there. At Flint, Michigan, he was employed at carriage work. At the time of the cement boom in Durham he returned to his home town and later became superintendent of the Raven Lake cement plant in Victoria County.

He was married in 1903 to Miss Kathleen McLean of Durham, and with the exception of the time at Raven Lake, all his married life has been spent in Durham. DEMONSTRATION

Tuesday morning of this week, saw the fall session of Durham High and Public School well under way, the teaching staffs of both institutions ready to give their best work after a lengthy summer holiday. The pupils too,—at least the primary rooms, appeared more than anxious to display their new purchases and put them to use. Miss Norma Gagnon had no less than forty-one commencing their school career. Who says that Durham's population is diminishing?
