

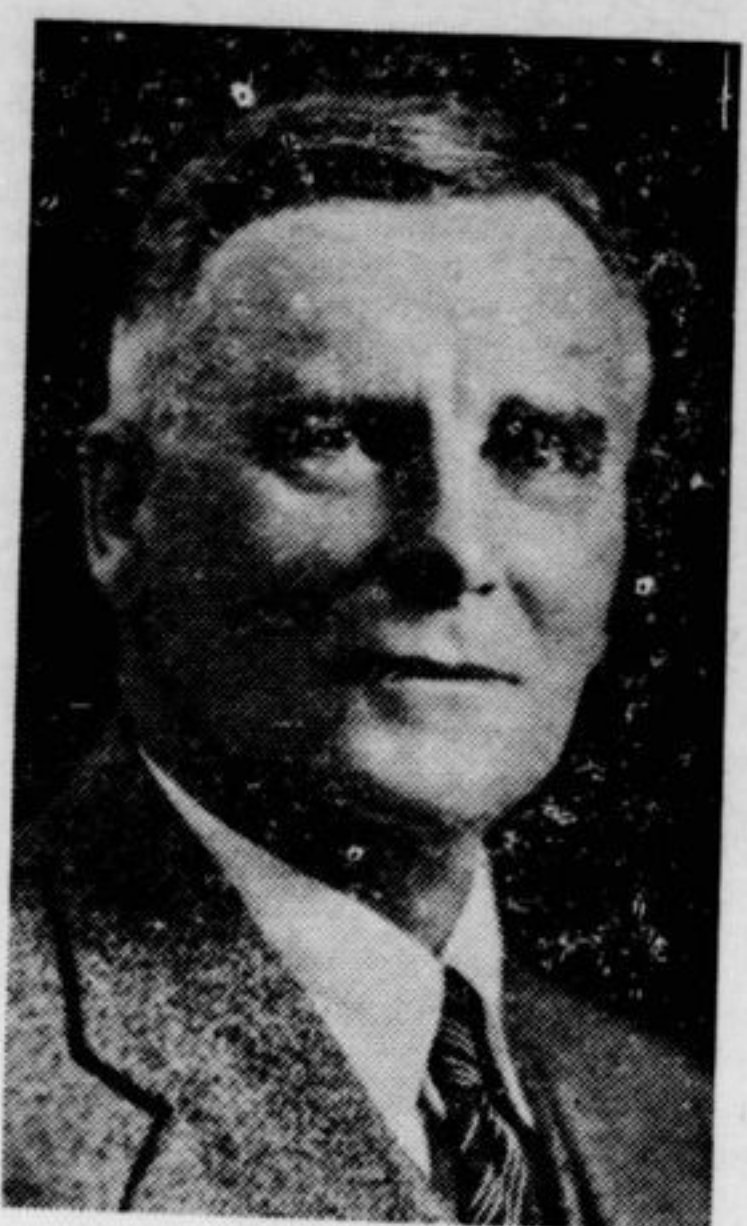
To the Electors of Grey-Bruce:

HISTORY OF MULOCK BAPTIST CHURCH

The first Baptist church in Bentinck was a Gaelic Baptist church. No record of the organization of that church has been kept, but it is known that it was in existence a little time before April 1875. Rev. Robert MacIntyre spoke to this little group of Baptist people in their homes. One of the earliest list of members that can be found contain the following names: Mr and Mrs J. Gillivray, Mr and Mrs Hector Macdonald, Mr and Mrs Archibald MacLean, Miss Mary MacGillivray and Mrs Rachael McKinnon.

On April 2, 1875 another group of Bentinck Baptists met in the home of Mr. Patrick O'Neil. On that occasion Elder J. C. Mukisk of Mt. Forest preached from Luke 12:32—"Fear not little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom." After preaching, Elder Mukisk made a statement of the scripture doctrines believed and held by regular Baptists and the group declared that these were the same held by themselves. Jonathan O'Neil was appointed church clerk.

A council was called on June 2, 1875 for the organization of this second Baptist church. The following neighboring Baptist churches were represented by these delegates: Chesley—John Sluggett, Robert Atkinson, Donald McGregor; Priceville—Elder R. MacIntyre, Angus Beaton, Archibald Beaton, Donald Beaton; Hanover—Deacon Whiteford, Robert Whiteford, R. Clement; Paisley—Elder McNeil, together with Elder J. C. G. evangelist; Mt. Forest—Elder G. F. Robertson, Deacon Poole, H. H. Stovel and Rev. D. Wright, pastor of the church.

One of the first list of names of the members constituting the church are as follows: Mr and Mrs Henry O'Neil, Jonathan O'Neil, Elizabeth MacLean, Catherine MacEachern, A. MacLean, Margaret MacLean, Alex MacGillivray, Mr and Mrs Morris Jones and Jane Maklorn, Mr. and Mrs. John McKechnie.

In January 1876 a meeting was held in the schoolhouse on the seventh for the purpose of considering uniting of the two churches and the building of a two church.

Elder A. Warren, pastor of the second church was elected chairman of the meeting and after some remarks showing the benefits that would arise from the two churches being united, it was moved by Henry O'Neil of second church and seconded by Archibald MacLean of second church that the first and second churches unite and be one church. The motion was carried unanimously.

The church was to be known as the regular Baptist church at Bentinck. Hector Macdonald and Henry O'Neil were the first deacons and J. O'Neil who had been clerk of the second church continued as clerk of the new church.

The church was erected in 1877 on the sixth con. north of the Durham road. The parsonage beside the church was erected in 1880. Both buildings are frame ones and this spring through the efforts of the Ladies' Aid and pastor, both have been redecorated. The land for the church was given by Patrick O'Neil.

Of the charter members three survive: Alex MacGillivray, Chatsworth; Mrs John A. Macdonald (Catherine MacEachern), Westhope, N.D.; Mrs John Macdonald (Mary MacGillivray) Wallard, Sask.

During the past 60 years the following pastors served the church faithfully: Rev. D. Wright, Elder A. Warren, Revs. Wm. Grant, J. C. Macdonald, Pastor Pattenham, Revs. A. McFayden, J. B. McKinnon, H. J. Roberts, J. C. Dunlop, J. McDermid, Pastor P. C. McGregor, Revs. D. McNeil, G. I. Burns, M. P. Campbell, C. E. Pineo, D. MacLean, Pastor J. N. Start, Rev. A. R. McDonald, Pastors, A. Hall, R. Barclay, Revs. Fred Ashton, Wm. Aird, Henry Crickington, J. Galloway, and Pastor Arthur Homer the present pastor.

Two of these pastors, G. I. Burns and J. Galloway were ordained in this church.

The Sunday School has been a flourishing organization of the church for 50 years. It was organized the year 1885. Rev. J. B. McKinnon was the first superintendent. Other superintendents were: Alexander Macdonald, John A. Macdonald, John MacLean. The present superintendent is Mr. A. C. Macdonald. He has been superintendent for 21 years. The present sec'y is Donald Macdonald and the treasurer is Arch. MacLean.

The Cradle Roll has at present a membership of 18, and has been going since 1912. Mrs W. Fulton is superintendent.

The Ladies' Aid Society was organized in March 1920 through Mrs. (Rev.) Aird, who was the first president. Other presidents were: Mrs Donald, Crickington, Miss Flora Macdonald, Mrs Dan MacLean and the present president Mrs Arthur Homer. Mrs Wm. Fulton has been sec'y since the organization of society. The present vice president is Mrs Hugh MacLean and the present treasurer is Mrs Finlay McCuaig.

The Mission Circle was organized during the time that Mr. Pattenham

was pastor. Mrs Patrick O'Neil was the first president. Other presidents were: Mrs Campbell, Mrs Pineo, Mrs A. R. Macdonald, Mrs Ashton, Mrs Aird, Miss Flora Macdonald, Mrs Crickington, Mrs Galloway and Mrs A. C. Macdonald, Mrs Wm. Fulton. Mrs Hugh MacLean is now sec'y and Mrs Dan MacLean treasurer. Mrs Hugh MacLean remembers attending some of the first meetings.

Mission Band was organized in 1918 under the leadership of Miss Flora Macdonald and Mrs. Wm. Fulton. Among the presidents were Elsie Boyce, Elton Adlam, Geo. Brown, Clifford Adlam, John McDonald, Ulva McDonald and Elsie Markle. The present officers are Ruth Vickers, Helen McCuaig, and Janet Patterson.

The B.Y.P.U. was organized in October 1926 through the efforts of Rev. Mr. Crickington and Mr. John Macdonald. The first officers were: Honorary pres., Rev. H. Crickington pres., John Macdonald, vice pres., C. MacLean, sec'y Florence Kress, treas. Elton Adlam. Present officers are: Hon. pres. Mrs A. Homer; pres. L. Mighton; vice pres., Arthur Adlam; sec'y, Gordon MacLean; treas., Reginald Adlam.

An organ was installed in the church during the pastorate of Rev. M. P. Campbell. The first organist was Mrs (Rev.) Campbell. Other organists were: Mrs (Rev.) Pineo, Miss Flora Macdonald and Miss Ulva Macdonald the present organist. Sixtieth anniversary services were held Sunday, August 11th, when Rev. John Galloway of Huntsville a former pastor was the guest speaker.

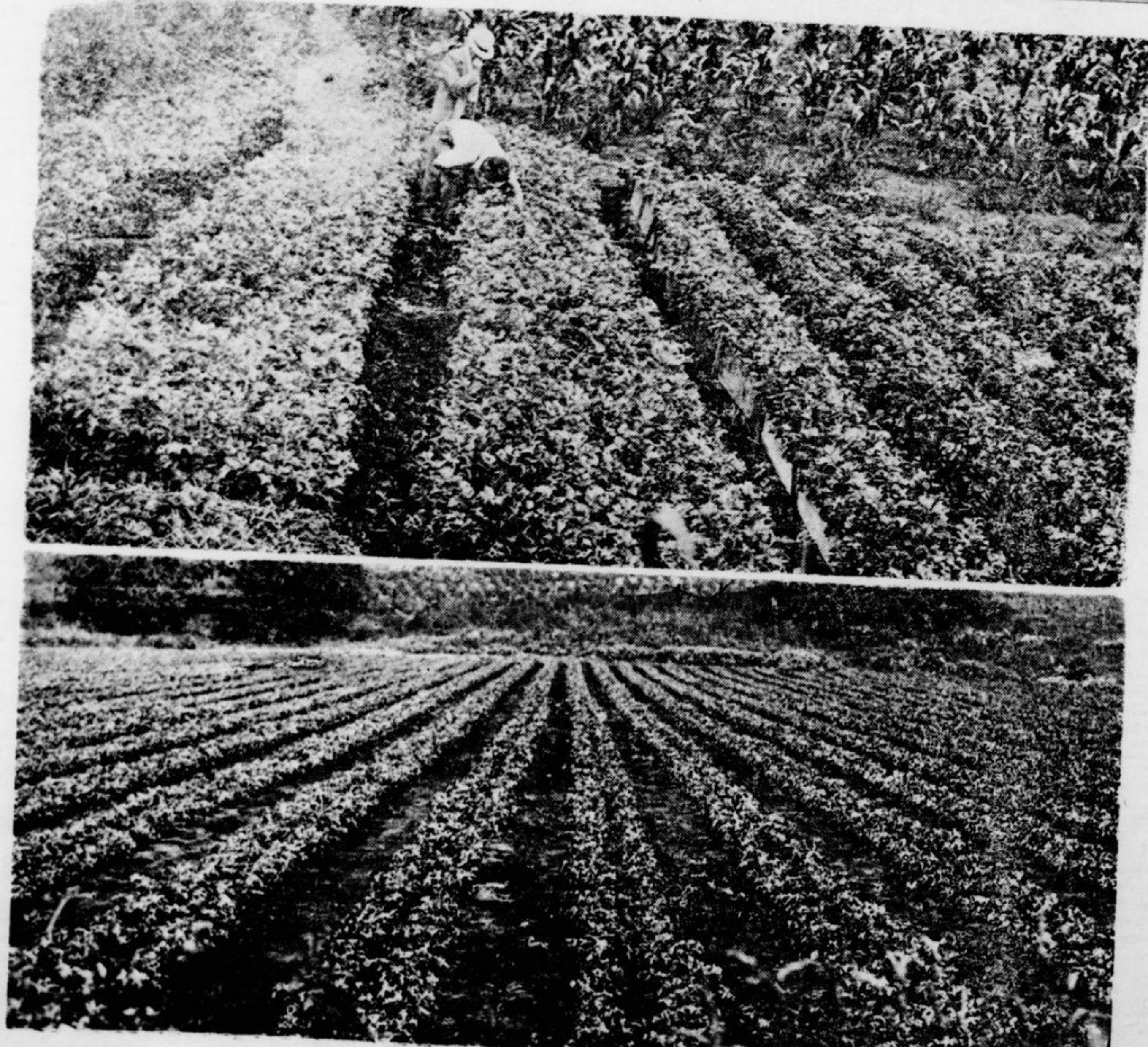

SUCCESSFUL CELERY GROWING IN CLARKSBURG

The above pictures show the large extent Mr. Jack Mitchell of Thornbury, is taking up in celery growing. In a four acre lot, Mr. Mitchell planted out in May, 60,000 celery plants. In the upper picture, are

seen Mr. Mitchell bending over to cut off a bunch of celery and Mayor Snetinger of Thornbury, well-known planter in a valley where a high temperature is secured and is now ready for market. A goodly number of them have been, or are being bleached by means of placing boards

along the rows to keep out the light, while the remainder will be bleached immediately by use of bleaching paper along the rows. The use of boards or paper bleaches the celery etc. as is the case in bleaching where earth is merely piled up along the rows.

While some of it is marketed, much of it will not be ready until on in September, when they will be pulled out, crated and stored in cold storage ready for Christmas and winter trade.
