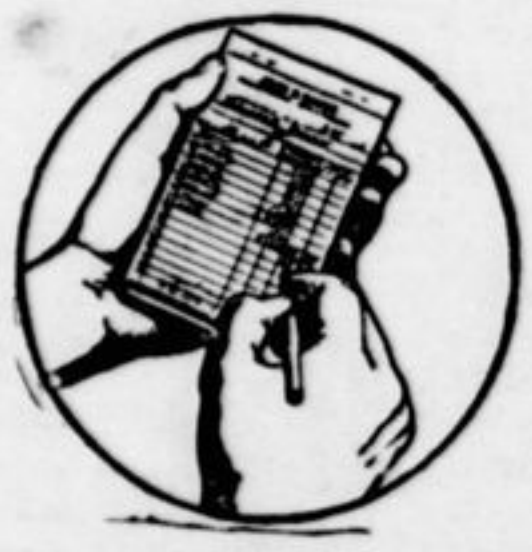

LIVE STOCK REPORT

By DUNN & LEVACK, Ltd., Toronto

September 17, 1935 On Monday the market opened very slow on account of an over-supply of 7000 cattle which proved to be too much for the present demand and all classes suffered a decline in price.

There was considerable activity in the sale of good stockers and feeders and a surprisingly large number changed hands at good prices.

There were very few choice heavy steers on the market and these sold at from 6 1/2 to 7 cents, while fair to good steers made from 5 1/2 to 6 1/2. In the butcher section, baby beefs continued to sell well at from 7 to 8 1/2 cents while butcher steers and especially heifers sold on a lower level.

Best quality butchers from 5 1/2 to 5 3/4 fair to good from 4 1/2 to 5 1/4, medium from 3 1/2 to 4 1/4, common 3 to 3 1/2. Best light stockers sold from 4 1/2 to 4 3/4 and feeders weighing from 8 to 9 sold at from 5 to 5 1/2 for return shipment to country points. The cow trade was easier. Best cows ranging from 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 with an odd top of 4 cents. The bulk of the good cows sold at from 2 1/2 to 3 1/4, common and medium from 2 1/4 to 2 3/4, canners and cutters 1 1/2 to 2. The bull trade held generally steady, bolognas selling from 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 and a few choice butcher bulls from 3 1/4 to 3 3/4.

Under a liberal supply of hogs prices weakened as buyers were bidding much lower prices. Monday's sales were made on the basis of 9.15 for truck deliveries and today, Tuesday, although the market was slow, sales were made on a steady basis.
