BENNETT CANNOT WIN Agnes Macphail herself says: MacKenzie King will be the Next Premier of Canada Then Why Elect a Member for Grey-Bruce who will only sit in Opposition? The Liberal policy as laid down by Mr. King in 1933, and restated many times during the campaign is simple and straightforward. It reads: The Liberal party believes that unemployment is Canada's most urgent national problem. It would deal with the present emergency conditions through a representative national commission which would co-operate with the provinces and municipalities in the administration of unemployment relief, and in an endeavor to provide work for the unemployed. As permanent measures the Liberal party is pledged to introduce policies which will serve to provide employment by reviving industry and trade, and to introduce a national system of unemployment insurance. In other words the Liberals will call together as soon as possible after the election, representatives of provinces, municipalities, community welfare organizations, labor bodies, employers and all interested parties, and an attempt will be made first of all to see how jobs can be provided for as many as possible, and second how those unable to get work can be maintained as comfortably as possible without burdening the community with an impossible relief load. The present lack of policy leads to hit-and-miss methods which are wasteful and extravagant without being comprehensive. A constitutional method of unemployment insurance would be worked out, and consideration given to other social reform measures, such as health insurance at an interprovincial conference. That would not be all. The Liberal trade policy would attempt to start the wheels of industry moving again, and provide the basic remedy for unemployment—putting men back to work. This combination of long-term and short-term methods offers substantial promise of ending unemployment.
