Agnes C. Macphail Elected for Fifth Term: Boasts Majority of 1501

Probably her greatest triump Agnes C. Macphail swept the riding of Grey-Bruce on Monday, creasing her majority from a bare 243 five years ago, to 1531 over Dr. Hall, her Liberal opposition, and 2112 over Dr. Campbell, Conservative opponent in three elections.

Wi h a Liberal in the field to supposedly split the vote given the U F.O.-Labor candidate, local Conservatives saw bright prospects of electing Mr. Campbell, while the Liberals, relying on a strong support for Dr. Hall, their candidate, in the Bruce part of the riding, hoped see him secure sufficient strength in Grey added to it to pull him out

Opinion in general was that Miss Macphail would emerge with a small majority of from 100 to 400, but very few believed it would reach four fig-

Firs returns to hand from tow of Durham, showed the swing to Mis Macphail when she polled 250 vote only 3 less than in 1930, with a Lif eral also in the field, while Campbe dropped 148.
