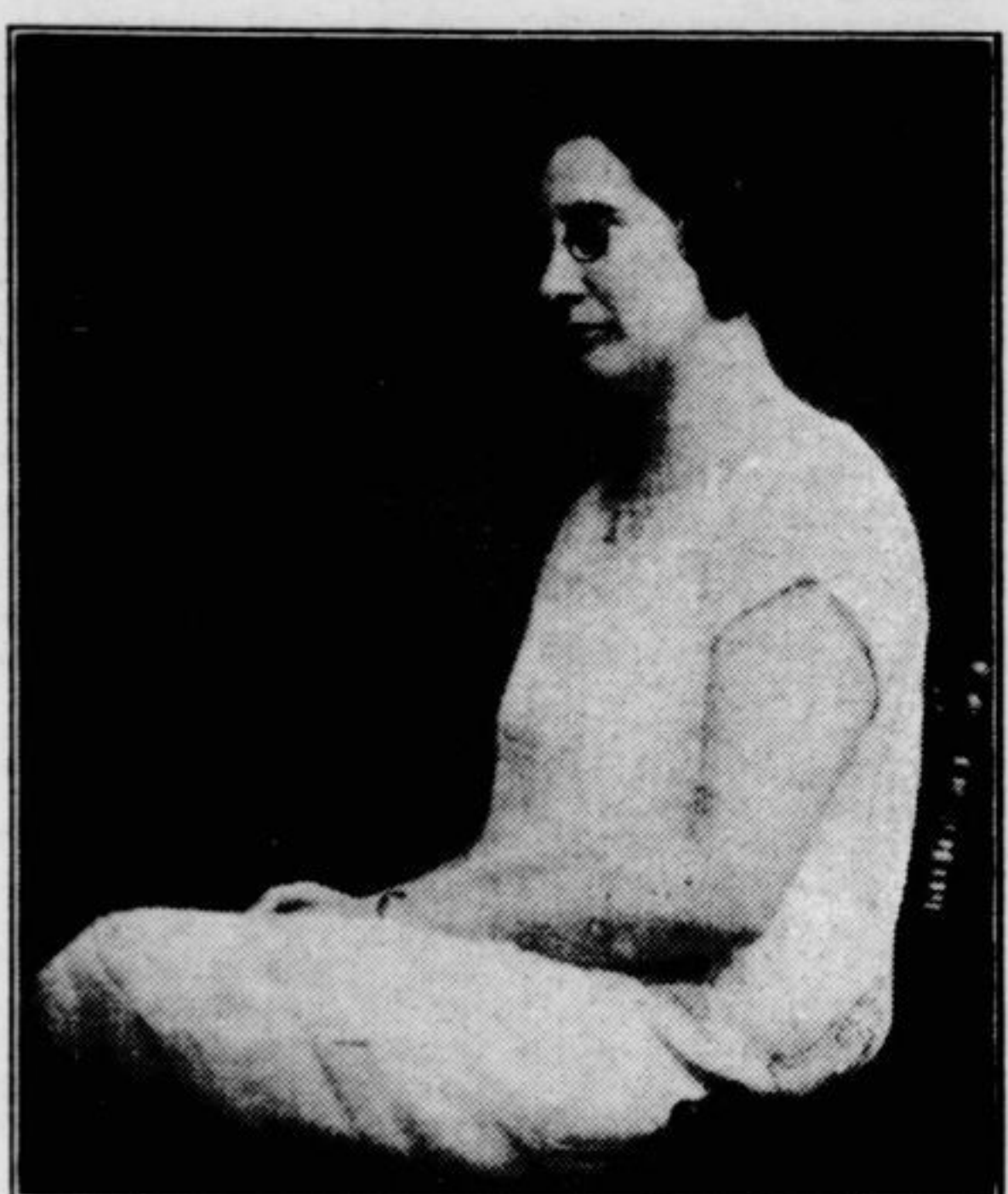

Electoral Landslide to Liberalism over Canada

Mackenzie King again Premier after five years' absence, with larger following than on any previous occasion since Confederation.

Canada said "we want Liberal rule again," and said it in no uncertain terms on Monday last. With the exception of Alberta, and the city of Toronto, (proverbially Conservative), the people very cordially said, "We want Mackenzie King in power once more." As well as the death-blow to Hon. R. B. Bennett, many of his cabinet—12 out of 19—went down in defeat. The showing of the Reconstructionist party and C.C.F. was a great surprise, and in the former, Hon. H. H. Stevens is leader and follower, as he is the sole candidate successful in his riding at East Kootenay, B.C. The C.C.F. have elected eight to parliament, their leader, J. S. Woodsworth also winning his home seat in North Winnipeg. Due to the wide area of Canada, the electorate were able over the radio to hear returns from six o'clock until near midnight, and as Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia registered 100% Liberal majority, and New Brunswick nine out of ten seats, it was plainly evident that Canada was to have Liberal rule the next five years. him, for the manner he conducted his campaign. Severely heckled at times, he was always in control of his temper, and though he knew he was playing a losing game he was in it to the finish.

The standing of the C.C.F.'s and Reconstructionists in the Dominion show up how seriously they were taken. There is no room at Ottawa for "isms" and the quicker they dissolve into thin air the better for them.

The landslide of the Liberal party is the biggest one in the history of Dominion politics. Hon. H. H. Stevens is the sole survivor of the Reconstructionists.

How will the election results be taken by Hon. G. H. Ferguson in his comfortable quarters in London, England? He will in all likelihood see the handwriting on the wall.

The vote polled in the new section of this riding was a tribute to Dr. W. A. Hall and he has reason to be proud of the confidence his electors placed in him.

The most aggressive political opponent of Miss Macphail, will agree to a man, that for stumping the country and organization of the polls, that no flies rest on her work.

W. P. Telford, Liberal, won North Grey by over 1400 from Porteous, former Con. member.

Did you notice Durham beat Chesley in total votes polled? There were 907 in Durham and 906 in Chesley.

Agnes Macphail's banner polls were Peabody in Sullivan, where she took 159 lead over Hall and Lamash in Bentinck with 110 lead, Dromore and Yeovil wards in Egremont gave her 106 and 105 majorities.

Another lady member for Dominion House. The election over Canada on Monday, resulted in the election of Mrs. George Black, Yukon, in place of her husband, who resigned through illness. Mr. Black was former speaker in the last House, and Mrs. Black will now represent that northern division. After fourteen years, Agnes Macphail finds another lady member to share the Commons seats, though opposite each other in views.

SOUTH WELLINGTON GOES LIBERAL. Much interest was manifested in the riding of South Wellington, which went to W. E. Gladstone, Liberal, after a thirty-five year session of Guthrie rule. Hugh Guthrie Jr.'s defeat broke the long term, his grandfather representing the same riding in his century, and his father, Hugh Guthrie representing it since 1900—first as a Liberal, then a Unionist in 1917 and a Conservative after the Premier Bennett's cannot but admire war.

Died from Lockjaw. Elmer Berry, a Brant township farmer living two miles northwest of Hanover, died in Hanover hospital last Thursday morning in his 42nd year. About a week previous he had received a bad cut on the hand while cutting corn. He had the wound dressed and went about his duties as usual till on Wednesday he was taken to hospital when it was found blood poisoning had set in. Lockjaw quickly developed which terminated in his death.

Hanover's Population Down. The population of Hanover, according to assessment roll just completed is 3,034 of whom 752 are males between the ages of 21 and 60, while 651 are children of between 5 and 18 years. The total population is 22 less than last year. There were 40 births and 20 deaths during the past year, for a natural increase in population of 20. There are 102 dogs and bitches in Hanover one more than last year. The total assessment of the town, less exempted properties, is \$1,433,627. This is some \$4,731 more than last year.

It is also the first grandchild of Mr and Mrs Bert Watson and Mr. and Mrs. Palmer Patterson. But even something more to remember is the fact that the new arrival came in on the landslide of Liberalism to Canada, and who may tell but that this political coincidence may be the forerunner of political events that will eventually put the 1935 arrival in the Premier's chair. He comes of good lineage and stock on both sides of the house, and if he gets a proper political name and background, who can foretell? In the meantime let him be called Mackenzie King.

Virginia Singers Feature Baptist Anniversary

A well-filled church greeted the anniversary preacher, Rev. C. Stanley Baggett, of Listowel, at the Baptist church last Sunday morning. The auditorium was beautifully decorated with flowers and ferns and autumn leaves. Sunny skies and midsummer weather made an ideal setting for a perfect day.

Mr. Baggett preached in the morning from the text, 1 John 13: "These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God; that ye may know that ye have eternal life, and that ye may believe on the name of the Son of God." The preacher spoke on the theme, "Blessed assurance", and stressed the comfort and peace we may have through knowing, and not guessing or hoping that we are saved from sin and its eternal consequences.

Special music by the choir at the morning service showed careful training in their rendition of a spirited anthem entitled "Thou art the King". Mrs. Gertrude Williamson Hall, in a rich contralto voice, sang two solos, "Listen to the children" and "Follow Me." Mr. Baggett, who is also an excellent baritone singer, sang "Somehow His love will never let me go."

In the evening, every seat, nook and corner of the auditorium, lobbies, choir-room, kitchen and Sunday school hall were filled to capacity, and many were not able to get in. The preacher chose as his theme "the world's only Hope". The text was Acts 16: 3: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved." He said that believing on the Lord Jesus Christ is not as easy as it seems; that it means more than mere acquaintance; it involves a consistent Christian life. It will take the best energies and watchfulness of full-blooded men and women. The preacher pointed out that salvation is not just getting your soul saved, but the salvation process includes the whole life, with its talents, means and influence. At the conclusion of his sermon Mr. Baggett sang "Only believe" by Robert Harkness. Mrs. Hall again favored with two solos "Evening prayer" and "Nearer my God to Thee," and the Virginia Jubilee Singers sang with perfect harmony, "Some" call Him Jesus, but I call Him Lord" and "Emmanuel."

On Monday evening the Jubilee Singers gave a concert of Southern melodies, spirituals, male quartette, ladies' trio, harmonic choruses, and solos. Their singing was a perfect symphony, each singer being a specialist in his or her part. The audience more than filled the church and were enthusiastic in their appreciation from start to finish. If you were not present, it is just too bad, but we expect to have them visit us again next year.

Agnes C. Macphail Elected for Fifth Term: Boasts Majority of 1501

Probably her greatest triumph, Agnes C. Macphail swept the new riding of Grey-Bruce on Monday, increasing her majority from a bare 243 five years ago, to 1531 over Dr. Hall, her Liberal opponent, and 2112 over Dr. Campbell, Conservative opponent in three elections.

With a Liberal in the field to supposedly split the vote given the U. F. O.—Labor candidate, local Conservatives saw bright prospects of electing Mr. Campbell, while the Liberals, relying on a strong support for Dr. Hall, their candidate, in the Bruce part of the riding, hoped to see him secure sufficient strength in Grey added to it to pull him out on top.

Opinion in general was that Miss Macphail would emerge with a small majority of from 100 to 400, but very few believed it would reach four figures.

Firs returns to hand from town of Durham, showed the swing to Miss Macphail when she polled 250 votes, only 3 less than in 1930, with a Liberal also in the field, while Campbell dropped 148. As results from Egremont, Glenelg and Bentinck polls filtered in, each showing increasing majorities, and Hanover gave a Macphail lead of 30 for the first time in its history, it was soon realized that the majority would mount over 1000. Egremont was as usual, Miss Macphail's banner township, with a lead of 458 over her nearest opponent. Her home township Artemesia, stood by her loyalty with 410 lead, Sullivan gave 431, Protca 276, Bentinck 345, Glenelg 196, Normanby 32 and Elderslie 1p, a new field 270. She thus captured 8 townships and 1 town, (Hanover).

Dr. Hall ran strong throughout the Bruce section excepting Elderslie township, gaining a total lead in Bruce of 1111 over Macphail, his chief opponent. He captured two townships, Brant and Carrick, with leads of 269 and 318 respectively, and five towns and villages—Paisley Walkerton, Chesley, Milgmay and Neustadt.

Though the lead was reduced to 237, Durham as usual was the Tory stronghold, Markdale, Dundalk, Fles-

erton also produced substantial Conservative majorities and Chatsworth a small one.

When her election was assured, Miss Macphail and a number of her supporters first visited Markdale, where she thanked the populace; then they toured to Durham, where the Town Hall was overflowing while she spoke briefly, incidentally voicing gratitude for her splendid vote in Durham. About 20 cars accompanied her to Hanover, where the Band was out to serenade the popular member and she addressed the throngs at L'rary grounds. 50 cars then went on to Walkerton where crowds again acclaimed her, and lastly she visited Chesley, reaching there about 1.00 a.m. At that late hour quite a large crowd was waiting to hear and honor the victor.
