Car Crashes Steam Tractor

When his speeding motor car crashed head on into a steam traction engine, owned and driven by Robert Mortley, of Dornoch, Gordon Wheeler of Brantford was instantly killed and his car, a 1934 Ford V8 coach, totally wrecked. So great was the impact that the car broke of both front wheels and axle of the engine, allowing the boiler to crush its way through to the back seat of car, squeezing the unfortunate driv-

er back there to his death. The accident occurred Saturday night on Prov. Highway No. 6, eight miles north of Durham, about 50 and a mile from Dornoch. It was just at the foot of the long down grade from Mor ley's gate, and Robt. Mortley, with his helper, Alvin Caswell of Durham, was driving his steam traction engine home, hauling the threshing separator, after his week's work. At Dornoch corner they had lit the lanterns, attaching one to front of engine and the other to of separator, and it was just a few minutes after 7.00 o'clock when the collision occurred. Mort ey was driving his engine well a ong the west, or right side of the oad, when the doomed car speeding north appeared at the top of grade on its left or wrong side of road. In a flash it was upon them, Wheeler apparently never noticing the light or if he did, too late to avoid the crash. Mortley had no time or oppor unity to dodge the oncoming car, and the terrific impact, heard two miles away, forced the car below the

boiler of tractor and punched a hole in boiler, allowing 150 lbs. of steam to escape. This alone would have finished the doomed man below, but he was already dead from a broken neck, several fractures of arms and legs, and the broken steering wheel piercing his body.

Mr Mortley was pitched on th pavement in front of the separator SENTED WITH TABLE LAMP wheels, while Alvin Caswell with him was jolted into the ditch on his right. Both were bruised but otherwise uninjured except that Caswell has a cut wrist. The severe jolt to tractor broke the tongue of separator attached to it, and one of tractor's heavy iron wheels was broken in several places, and lay in east ditch.

A large crowd was soon on the scene and on learning of the accident Highway Traffic Officer Orval Storey of Owen Sound with Prov. Constables Noble and Cook arrived and patrolled the highway in that vicinity to prevent further accidents. Coroner Dr. Phillips, Chatsworth took charge
