Mr and Mrs Palmer Phillips and children of Toronto, were up for the birthday party and visited Sunday at Kinnell's.

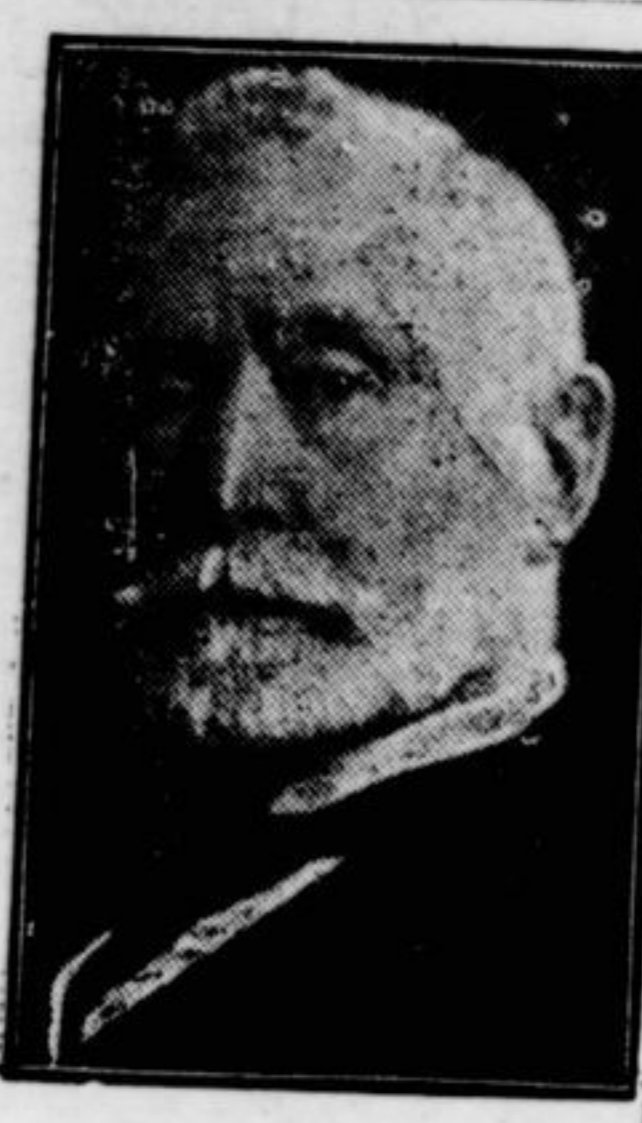
