THE SUCCESS OF PREMIER MACKENZIE King in persuading Hon. C. Dunning to come into the cabinet as Minister of Finance was, it is felt generally, a master-stroke. It shows a number of things: the spirit of public service in the King; the confidence in the King Gov't displayed by the new Minister, the determination of Prime Minister to leave no stone unturned in grappling with the problems of the day.

In 1930 he was defeated in Regina and the Gov't was also defeated. He foresees politics and went back into business. He ran the Seignory Club for the C.P.R. He reorganized the Consolidated Paper Corporation. He became president of the Canadian Equitable Life. He took over the Presidency of the Maple Leaf Milling Company to reestablish its financial position and went to the Board of Barclays Bank.

Mr. Dunning has often remarked that to be a successful minister of finance it is essential that a man be both a good politician and a good business man. This rare combination of qualities is happily found in Mr. Dunning himself. He is equally at home talking to the farm wife in her kitchen, addressing a small-town political meeting, managing a business or mixing with the nabobs of finance.

The recall of Hon. G. H. Ferguson from the High Commissionership in London, revives rumors that he will re-enter politics as leader of the Ontario Conservative party. The colorful Mr. Ferguson puts in the shade most aspirants for that soon-to-be-opened position.

## Hydro Rates Lowered to Farm Power Users

EFFECTIVE NOVEMBER 1  
As printed in last week's Review, there has been a hydro rate reduction for farm power users, the new rate schedule becoming operative on Nov. 1.

T. Stewart Lyon, Hydro chairman speaking at Brampton announced reductions to rural consumers of 20% for farmers in the Class 3 and superior divisions would become effective, with reductions of 10% for farm users below the Class 3 standards. He strongly advocated the further introduction of Hydro power into the rural areas. "Hydro will make no money merely lighting a farmhouse and barn," he said. "The average farmer could chop his own grain for 4 cents a bag, where it now costs him 7 and 8 cents a bag at the crossroads chopping mill."

Joseph Gibbons, Toronto, objected to this view, on the ground that the farmer would be using metered power, while the chopping mill operator, although he might operate only two days a week, would be paying for power six days of the week.

Premier King is hailed to-day as a national political hero. Five years from now, a fickle electorate will probably be clamoring for his official head.

Premier Aberhart of Alberta is right when, in announcing elimination of all liquor advertising in Alberta, he says: "We feel this advertising is a waste of expenditure; there is no need of it."
