

OBITUARY

(By our Priceville correspondent) MRS. W. P. WATSON

There passed away on Sunday morning Dec. 1st, one of Nature's noblest women, in the person of Abigail Whitmore, familiarly and lovingly known as 'Abbie', the beloved wife of W. P. Watson of the 22nd row of Egremont, after an illness of eight months and five days resulting from a stroke suffered on March 25. During which time, though unable to speak, or move but one arm, her severe trial was borne with patience and Christian fortitude, amidst the great pain suffered at times.

After a long and favourable acquaintance of over sixty years, the writer is moved with a feeling of sorrow and compassion at her passing and her suffering. Of a neighborly and amiable nature, she endeavored herself to all her acquaintances. The deceased and her husband were married on the 2nd of July 46 years ago and resided at the home in which she died, continuously since, dying at the age of 76 years, and 3 months. Mr. Watson is an honored elder of Amos Presbyterian Church, and feels his loss very deeply, as do the sons.

The funeral on Tuesday was largely attended by friends and neighbors surrounding. Rev. Mr. Honeyman, of Amos church, her pastor, conveyed many comforting words to the bereaved and other hearers, at the residence, church and graveside, and read a favorite hymn of the deceased used in lulling her children to sleep.

'There is a happy land, far far away.' Sympathizers from a distance were Mrs Gordon Brown, Mrs Arthur Shepherd, Mr and Mrs Wm. Davis, nephews and nieces, from Toronto, and many from Mount Forest, Durham, and Priceville. Many beautiful flowers silently testified to the high esteem in which the deceased was held. McDermid and family, Priceville; Amos church congregation, Dromore; wreath from husband and sons, Chas. and Campbell, and others.

Watson, Wallace McDermid, grandchildren; Elmer and Wilfrid Watson, Priceville; Charles McGillivray, Chas. Moffat, Durham; and Wm. Davis, Toronto, nephews, and S. J. McDermid, son-in-law, of Priceville. Colin McMillan of Holstein, was the funeral director.
