Live Stock Market Report

Almost 4000 cattle arrived for Monday's market, which was somewhat heavy for the present outlet and prices were lower, in spite of the fact that the tariff has now been lowered to the extent of \$1 per cwt. on cattle shipments to the United States weighing over 750 lbs. Therefore, at the moment, there is no benefit to be derived from the change of tariff, as cattle are selling on Toronto market at higher prices, expenses considered.

A few lots of choice heavy steers sold at from 6 1/2 to 7c, but the bulk of the fair to good ranged from 5 1/2 to 6 1/2, and plain kind from 5 to 5 1/2. Butcher cattle were fully a quarter lower, choice selling from 5 1/2 to 6c, fair to good from 5 to 5 1/2c, common and medium 4 to 4 1/2. Choice baby beefs were in strong demand at from 7 1/2 to 8c, medium to good from 7 to 7c. The cow trade featured the market under strong demand, choice selling from 4 to 4 1/2, with a few tops at 4 1/2. Fair to good from 3 1/2 to 3c, common to medium 2 1/2 to 3c, canners and cutters 2 to 2 1/2c. Choice milk cows and springers sold from \$40 to \$60 each.

The lamb market held steady, choice lambs selling at 9c, with those of medium to good quality at from 8 1/2 to 8 3/4c. Best light sheep brought from 4 to 4 1/2c, heavies from 2 1/2 to 3 1/2c. Calves again featured the market, advancing to a top of 11c, with the bulk of the choice calves selling from 10 to 10 1/2c, fair to good 9 to 10c, common and medium 7 to 8 1/2c.

Opening bids for hogs were lower, but the market held steady Monday, sales being made on the basis of 7.75 f.o.b. and 8.25 to 8.40 for truck delivery. Today, Tuesday, the market was stronger and prices advanced 10c to 15 cents.

Something like shipping coals to Nova Scotia; South Africa imported 475,000 cwt. of wheat from Canada in 1934. Canada was the only source of supply, the South Africa deficiency of wheat arising out of a shortage of production. A Normanby Tp. orchard that was ruined by the extreme winter weather two years ago, was replanted last spring with 43 new apple trees. One of these produced over a dozen blossoms and a pair of apples, a surprising performance for a first year's growth. The orchard is owned by Mr. Albert Huehn of the 16th con. Exports of Canadian bacon to Great Britain during November, 1935, amounted approximately to 11,500,000 pounds as compared with 9,600,000 pounds in November 1934. This brings the bacon exports to the Old Country for the first eleven months of 1935 up to 116,875,100 pounds an increase of 6,750,100 pounds on the corresponding months of 1934.

WILLIAM SCAIFE

There died at his home at Grand Valley, on Dec. 16th, one of the town's most respected and honored citizens, Wm. Scaife, in his 83rd year. Mrs Thomas Allan of Durham is his sister and mourns his passing. He was the son of the late Joseph Scaife of East Garafraxa and as a boy of three came north from St. Catharines, where he was born and settled on the farm now owned by Jos. R. Carroll. He was married in early life, his wife predeceasing him 18 years ago and in 1922 wedded Miss Annie Park of Buffalo, who survives him.

In 1918, Mr. Scaife moved from the farm into Grand Valley. He had been a faithful and devoted member of Trinity United church, Grand Valley, and for years a member of the session. The past three years he has served as representative elder. He was also an enthusiastic member of both Bowling and Curling clubs and up until 18 months before his death, had taken a keen and active interest in these bodies.

The funeral was held from his late home and church on Dec. 19th, conducted by Rev. M. Sellar, who paid loving tribute to the sterling moral worth of deceased's life and character. He pointed out that his gracious and winsome Christian personality found its root and centre in Christ, to whom he surrendered his life in Victoria Methodist Church in East Garafraxa away back in the seventies.
