Cars in Collision Near Hanover. Returning from Galt hockey game in Walkerton, Monday night in the snowstorm, Mr. H. Blake, driving E. ## Agricultural Society Has Good Year

The annual meeting of the Durham Fair board was held in the I.O.O.F. Hall, Friday afternoon, Jan. 17th. President J. E. Crutchley presided. The sec'y-treasurer's report showed a marked increase in receipts for the year as compared with recent years. The expenditures were also higher than usual, leaving a small bank balance of \$17.45 on hand.

The grounds committee convener reported considerable improvements having been performed on the Fair grounds, the race track had been put in excellent shape, a judge's stand erected and yards for sheep and swine constructed. The report also showed greater amount paid out in prize money, as compared with recent years, a total of \$445.73, while that paid for attractions totaled \$226.60.

The Fair board made a special effort in 1935 to make their fair more attractive and educative and feel they accomplished this quite satisfactorily. As a result of these extra expenditures and the weather on Fair day not being the best, there are some bills yet to be met, which the officials hope to clear up within the year.

TRINITY CHURCH CONGREGATION BURN MORTGAGE The annual vestry meeting of Trinity church was held in the rectory and began with a hot supper. Rev. J. R. Thompson conducted a worship service.

Mr G. C. Webster, treasurer gave the financial statement showing a balance on hand. Mr. George Jueck reported for the Layman's Association. About \$100 had been raised which was spent in repair work, especially in the chancel of church. Mrs T. G. Hutton reported the work of the Guild for the year, showing something over \$200 had been raised and a small balance was on hand. The Y.P.A. report was presented by Miss Emily Hunt, receipts and expenditure being in the neighborhood of \$100. The Sunday School report was given by Miss Islay Allan. Warden Baldwin and Warden Crutchley each addressed the congregation on the work of the year.

A very pleasing feature of the evening was the burning of the rectory mortgage. This little ceremony was conducted by the rector in a brief message and prayer and the warden and treasurer then burned the mortgage before all present.

There was a discussion as to a form of memorial to be placed in the church in memory of the late Misses Mary A. and Eliza E. Edge, who had been most faithful workers and to whose legacy to church was largely due its freedom from debt this year. A committee was appointed, Messrs A. L. Baldwin and Robert Hughes, Mrs E. Kress and Mrs W. Firth to consider the form of memorial to express the deep gratitude of rector, warden and congregation. Mr W. G. Bayley was vestry clerk.

## An Empire Mourns the Death of a Beloved Sovereign

KING GEORGE V FINAL ILLNESS AND LATER DEATH, SHOCKS THE NATION.—FUNERAL WILL BE OBSERVED AS DAY OF MOURNING THROUGHOUT BRITISH POSSESSIONS.—THE PRINCE OF WALES ASSUMES THE TITLE OF EDWARD VIII.

The beloved 70 year old monarch passed peacefully away at Sandringham House, Norfolk County, (100 miles from London) at 11.55 a.m. (6.55 p.m. E.S.T.)

The King was suddenly taken ill only Friday last. His last appearance in public was on Wednesday. However he has been in delicate health since 1928, when he contracted bronchial pneumonia. Only a "miracle" of medical science saved his life then.

News of the King's death quickly spread throughout the British Empire,—in fact in a short time the news became world-wide news. Britain's new king, Edward VIII, is a

## OBITUARY

### JOHN MILLS

After a lengthy illness of over five months, Mr. John Mills, died at his home on Bruce Street on Monday afternoon in his seventy-seventh year. Hardening of the arteries hastened the end, though for the past two years he has been in failing health. Over three months ago he spent a few weeks in Durham hospital, but he yearned for home and as but little could be done for him in hospital, he was taken back home where thirteen weeks since, his wife has night and day been his faithful attendant and nurse.

Deceased was the son of late Jno. and Hannah Mills, and a pioneer of Sullivan township, where on the 4th concession, two miles north-west of Dornoch, he was born on April 14, 1859. In 1892 he was married to Christina Stewart of Bentinck and they resided on the old Mills homestead until their removal to Durham in 1924. They had no family and she, and one brother Wm., Grand-son picked the top of the net, while Wilson and Dean of Durham were both benched. In the third frame Durham displayed the prettiest team play of the season and ran wild to score 6 goals. Had it not been for McCrae's good work in Palmerston nets, there would have been several more. Kemp, Listowel refereed and gave Durham 5 of the 6 penalties.
