> PROPOSE BUS LINE THROUGH DURHAM

The Central Ontario Bus Lines are changing the franchise in several of their routes and hope they receive a kindly reception from the authorities. They want a franchise from Kincardine to Collingwood via Walkerton, Hanover, Durham, Flesherton and Singhampton. This would connect with the Blue Water Highway service at Kincardine and with the Midland service at Collingwood and would connect also with bus service from London via Wingham to Walk-

ed service through Bruce, Grey and Simcoe counties in a district which is not now served by either railway or bus line. The Central Ontario bus lines also propose a direct bus service from Kincardine through Port Elgin, South-

erton. This would give a much need-
