Toronto, February 19. If the first week of the session is any criterion, there is going to be plenty of fireworks before the legislative program.

Former Premier Henry, who perhaps was not exactly sorry that Premier Heppburn was absent at the Walker trial in London, strongly attacked the proposed income tax, though he admitted he favoured the principle of income tax as generally applied.

The moving and seconding of the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne produced two speeches of high calibre. St. Clair Gordon, Liberal member for West Kent, and J. H. Marceau, Liberal member for Nipissing, mover and seconder respectively, won high praise from all sides of the House for their splendid presentations.

These two speeches were free from interruption, as is nearly always the case, but the debate before and after the moving and seconding of the Throne speech was lively and interesting.

One point that the Opposition appeared to overlook, and which was brought out by the government, is that the tax is not a new one. Municipalities for thirty years have had the power to tax income within the limits of their municipalities, though comparatively few did so.

It must not be forgotten, also, that all the revenue will not go into the provincial treasury. Municipalities will be reimbursed and other costs will lessen the net return to the province.

With Premier Heppburn back in his accustomed seat, the legislature will be an even more interesting spot. Although his health is not completely restored the premier is expected to adopt his usual vigorous policy in leading the government.
