## Council to Consider Combining Town Offices

All members of Durham Council were present Monday evening, when several questions of importance were before the Board.  
A communication of the Provincial Government asked strict purging of relief lists, that only those actually deserving, should obtain relief. This has already been done in Durham and the letter was turned over to the relief Committee.  
G. S. Kearney forwarded his resignation as Public Utilities Com'r., which was accepted by the Council. A special meeting of Council is called for 5 p.m. Thursday when a successor will be appointed to complete the Commission.  
The Dept. of Highways had forwarded an agreement to be signed by Council for upkeep of main street. The Dept. does necessary sanding for 29 ft. strip, but town pays half cost for any beyond this. Town is also responsible for any damages or injury. The Council did not favor some of the clauses, but decided upon consideration they were not so objectionable, and passed a motion authorizing signature.  
Strathroy Council asked endorsement of a resolution to Gov't, stating the furniture industry was being demoralized and hurt by present tariffs and asking better protection. On motion of McGowan-Lauder, Council endorsed this resolution and ordered copies of same sent to Miss Macphail M. P., Hon. Chas. Dunning and Hon. J. L. Hsley, Minister of National Revenue.  
The I.O.D.E. was granted free use of Town Hall for 1936, and Miss Hughes given permission to remove a large tree in front of residence.  
An Estimate of Works program had been sent in by Mayor and Clerk, the Gov't contributing 75% of cost to projects undertaken to provide cash relief for the unemployed.  
Tree planting was also discussed, and it was deemed reforestation would be timely in various parts in town. The Government supplies the young trees free of cost on Clerk's order the Council paying freight only. Board of Works reported all hydrants snowplowed open for use in event of fire and teams ready to draw chemical engine if necessary.  
General accounts, \$845.86 and relief for Feb., \$181.35, were passed.  
The report of the Auditors, Mrs. S. F. Dargavel and G. E. Kearney, was received and left with the finance Com. for inspection, before its adoption.  
With the Utilities Com. requiring a new Sec'y-Treas., Coun. Duffield brought up the idea of amalgamating the position with the offices of town clerk and treasurer, getting another man for outside line work of hydro, and for waterworks. He thought \$1000 a year would be saved in salaries paid. The Finance Com. was appointed to meet on Friday with Public Utilities Com. and discuss it.

## Durham won 1st Semi-final Clinton Plays Here Saturday Night

The largest crowd to attend a hockey match in Owen Sound this season saw Durham capture the first semi-final game Monday from the Rangers City League champions by a 3-2 score.  
Durham ran up a 2-0 lead in first period, made it 3-0 early in second, but in last frame the Rangers speeded up and a lucky goal at opening inspired them to turn on the heat, and a well-earned one followed. The Rangers proved to be a hard-checking team with a stout defence—Blair and McConnachie, who were also prominent in rushes on Durham citadel. Their defence played the entire game as did Durham's also—E. Schutz and C. McGirr. The locals will miss Ken Wilson, who has taken a position in Sudbury, and as Trushinski did not come from Walkerton, Durham had only the two. They did valiant work in repulsing the determined local assaults, as did J. Schutz in the nets.  
The Raybould, Dean and Cassidy line was ever dangerous, Raybould especially being closely checked. It was the second line of Rennie, Elvidge and Moses which showed the scoring punch in first period. Rennie notched the first, taking Elvidge's pass through the home defence to coast; in on the nets. Moses took Rennie's pass behind the defence and picked the corner, for Durham's second goal.  
The second session was only two minutes gone when Durham counted No. 3. Raybould slipped over the blue line and made a neat pass to Cassidy who glided in on Greenaway, feinted him out of position and lobbed puck into an open net. Thereafter Durham assumed the defensive, and merely protected their lead.  
With third period 1 minute old, L. Lenahan lifted a weak puck from blue line. Schutz dropped his stick to block it, but stick fell on his shoes, and the disc slipped in between his skates for Rangers' first goal—a soft one. That set them afire and they matched speed, to play with the Durham speedsters, and score again when Lenahan slipped a pass to McConnachie, unguarded in front of nets. Three penalties took some of the steam out of Rangers' attacks, but neither team could score in final 10 minutes.

## MIDLAND TO SPEND \$180,000 ON RELIEF

(Midland Free Press)  
Unemployment relief in Midland is going to cost \$493.15 every day during 1936, according to estimates passed by Council at its February meeting.  
Every week will see \$3,465.38 spent to keep the unemployed of the town; every month, \$15,000.  
The total estimates for the year for the Welfare Committee, are \$180,000.  
This amount, however, will not all come directly out of the pockets of Midland ratepayers. The province pays the lion's share and \$154,000 of the total relief cost will be paid back to the town by the Ontario Government. Midland ratepayers' share is \$26,000.

Kinnee representing the evening auxiliaries read the scripture lesson and took the prayer that youth might have their vision of God clear and unobstructed and their enthusiasm and energies directed into channels of usefulness and service. Miss M. J. McGirr spoke on "The Day of Prayer," telling how it originated and showing what is yet to be done before this day will reach its maximum of power. Mrs. H. ## KING'S MESSAGE WAS WELL RECEIVED

On Sunday morning last, Durham in common with the British Empire was at the radio, to hear the first message broadcast over the air, from our new King, Edward VIII. The time set was 4.00 p.m., in England, which is equivalent to 11 a.m. Eastern Standard time. As this coincided with church service, many felt the call of the new King ahead of the higher courts of the church; others who lived near the church heard the broadcast in their own home, meandering into church during the long prayer; others again felt the new King's message could be put off till evening when it was again electrically transcribed over the air. Then again several churches had radios installed, for the occasion, all in the line of service to the people, who had no radio and wished to hear the King. Queen St. Church, through the kindness of G. R. Padfield had one of his good Philco radios and the reception was excellent.  
We have yet to hear one critical word regarding the sum and substance of the King's address, or the manner in which it was delivered. At first, the voice so far away, yet also so near, appeared to have a nervous hesitancy, but as the speech went on, the speaker had more control of himself and every sentence was fluent. The speech was a model in clarity, and as well as picturing the family's grief, and over the loss of husband and father, it was also the grief of his subjects. Said the King, "It is no mere figure of speech when I say my father reigned in the hearts of all."  
Special reference was given to the great Indian Empire over which he is now King Emperor. There may be more in this than we are aware of, for the teeming millions of India, have in the past, been thorns in the flesh of the rulers of Britain.  
It was not a lengthy speech, but shaken down and condensed, it showed thought behind it all. As King George was, so the son shall be, considerate of his vast and far-flung family.
