PARCEL POST TAKES ANOTHER LITTLE BIT

The present method of weighing parcels to the nearest pound is cancelled, and in future parcel post parcels mailed in Canada for delivery in Canada weighing fractions of a pound over an even pound will be liable in addition to the even pound rate to a charge of one cent per ounce, of fraction thereof over the even pound rate up to the next highest pound rate or group rate as the case may be.
