Last Week was Liveliest of Session

Miss Macphail's Weekly Letter

House of Commons, Ottawa June 20th, 1936.

The last week is the best week of the whole session. No one could charge the members with dullness or boredom this week, they kept alert and interested even through long sittings and humid atmosphere.

Mr. Pouliot, the obstreperous member for Temiscouata, got in very wrong with Mr. King by referring to him as a "White Russian".

The massive and venerable Montreal member said he would rather leave the House than put up with the taunts of Mr. Pouliot.

The Liberal government have once more moved for the removal of Section 98 from the Criminal Code.

Quite sensibly Mr. Lapointe argued that it did not prevent communists anyhow, and said "Laws that are not favoured by public opinion do not achieve any good."

Mr. Bennett said he could not entirely agree with the government's attitude and stated that there was a different viewpoint to sanctions which had been expressed by Premier Hertzog of South Africa and so far, Mr. Bennett said, he could find no lack of logic in it.

That Canada should take careful stock of her relation to the world and formulate a foreign policy for the immediate future, was urged by Mr. Woodsworth.

Mr. Woodsworth followed Great Britain, which attitude created an inferiority complex. Canada, he said, was in no danger of attack, since United States would neither attack us nor permit another country to do so.

Our immunity from attack was also emphasized by Mr. King. "Canada, it is true, unlike many less fortunate countries is not exposed to direct and imminent danger of attack and conquest by any country."

Better leave it, he said, as it was, with English bills for English communities.

Mr King spoke heatedly of "intolerance and bigotry" as shown by the Barber amendment, which, however, found strong support in the House.

There was a good deal of tension and ill-feeling displayed; enough to show that the language and racial questions could be made disruptive and embittering.

As Mr Bishop puts it, the Radio Act went through without any static and with a minimum of discussion.

From now on no private stations can be set up without an Order-in-Council being passed and all the revenue collected from radio licenses, to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation was used in another branch of the Marine Department.

Mr. Howe, Minister of Marine, pointed out that we have far too privately owned which complicate channels of communication.

Of the 51 Canadian stations only eight are owned by the Commission, while in Great Britain all stations are gov-

ernment owned and controlled. Australia is a bit closer than we are to the British ideal.

Residents in the Yukon had to rely on San Francisco for any Canadian news of the last campaign, Mrs Black member for the Yukon, told the House, and all overseas news either comes through that station or Alaska which fact reduces very greatly the use of the radio in that part of the country.

The House prorogues Monday, June 22nd.

Paving Contracts Awarded. The contracts have been awarded by the Ontario Department of Highways for the paving to be done during the present season in Grey County. The road was in bad shape in the spring but with its completion entire highway will be paved.
