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## Grey will Retain Present System of Tax Collection

Grey County Council at special session in Meaford last Thursday, voted unanimously to ask the Ontario Government for legislation ratifying their current system of collecting taxes. Now taxes are levied in current year to collect for ensuing year and this bylaw was quashed as illegal, when the Town of Hanover took the matter court. The legal system of levying and collecting same year means more confusion and much greater interest charges, which was opposed by Co. Treas. Mercer and H. L. Cummings, Deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs, who explained the two systems, agreed that Grey would be better off financially to continue as at present. Under present system, Grey is in best financial shape of any county in the province. Reeve Rily, Meaford, and Reeve Angus McArthur, Glenelg, moved that present method be retained which was carried, without dissent. The council later took its annual fishing trip on Meaford bay.

## OBITUARY

### JOHN McNALLY

A lifetime resident of Glenelg township and Durham, Mr John McNally passed to his reward, Monday morning at his home in Durham, in his 79th year. He has been in failing health the last two years, being critically ill last winter but recovered somewhat in the spring.

He was born on the McNally homestead at Edge Hill in Glenelg township and spent the greater part of his life farming on Lot 7, con. 7 in Zion community. He was a public spirited citizen anxious to serve in his church and district to the best of his ability. At Zion church he was long a member of the Official Board, he was trustee in the school section and for many years served as a councillor of the Township. Nineteen years ago, he removed to Durham and here he has been an active member of Queen St. United church and a town councillor for three years. Deceased was a large-hearted man, whose sympathetic unselfish disposition widened his circle of friends among old and young.

He married three times. His first wife was Martha Cook, and his second wife was Mary Stewart. The family are (Mary), Mrs Hugh McArthur, (Kate) Mrs R. L. Summers of Vancouver, B. C.; Roy, at Alask, Sask.; Stewart of High River, Alta; and Lorne and (Eva) Mrs James Crutchley of Durham.

A little over a year ago he married Miss Agnes Dunn who survives. Two brothers and five sisters survive also: William at Lumsden and Joseph on the old homestead, Glenelg; Mrs Peter Campbell, Saskatoon; Mrs H. McKechnie, Bethune, Sask.; Mrs Wm. Cooke of Elmwood; Mrs Geo. Ritchie, Glenelg; Mrs W. J. Cook, Glenelg.

The funeral service was at his late residence on Garrfraxa street on Wednesday at 2 o'clock and at 2.30 at Zion United church, Glenelg which could not contain the large assembly of mourners. Interment was made in Zion cemetery.

### FRED GAGNON

The death took place on Thursday last in Atlanta, Georgia, of Mr Fred Gagnon, brother of Peter Gagnon of town. Deceased was stricken with appendicitis and though the operation was successful, resistance was too weak to pull through. Direct mourners are his wife and small daughter; two brothers, Peter of Durham; Chas. of Watertown, N.Y. and three sisters, Mrs Pelletier, Fort William; Mrs. Jirepy, Beauharnois, Que.; Mrs Root, Philadelphia.

'Fred' was a resident of Durham, for about 18 months, engaged by the Dept. of Highways, winning for himself many friends. From here he went to Chicago where he was employed with the General Motors, and the past year has been in Georgia. On receipt of word of his passing, Peter Gagnon flew from Chicago to Atlanta, to return with his brother's remains to Detroit.

Mrs P. Gagnon and nephew Jack, Mr and Mrs Mack Saunders and Mr. and Mrs Robt Campbell attended the funeral from Durham. Deceased was 42 years of age.

## Dr. Ward Koch

### Gov't Director at Harrow

The Ontario Government is leaving no stone unturned in the carrying out of experiments as to the whys and wherefores of the many varied diseases that affect plant life in Ontario.

As is known perhaps to few in this northern stretch of Southern Ontario, tobacco is rapidly becoming one of the major products of Canada and home-grown tobacco in the last two years has been used more and more in the manufacture of Canadian cigarettes. Of all places in the Dominion, Essex and Kent counties are most productive of a good yield, despite the fact that the tobacco crop can be attacked by any one of 100 diseases, many of which cannot yet be combated successfully. At Harrow, Ont., the Government has an experimental station where experts under the direction of Dr. Ward Koch a Durham boy, are carrying out experiments. The annual field day was at Harrow last week, when visitors from all parts of Western Ontario came to the farm and inspected the work being done on tobacco, dairy products, soy beans and horticulture.

Dr. Koch is now holidaying for a couple of weeks at his home here with his mother and brother.
