Occupies Late Father's Pulpit at Anniversary

Rev. Douglas Kendall, Bondhead, delisted large crowds at Amos church, Dromore, Anniversary services.

Sunday and Monday of this week were days rich in memory to both speaker and listener, at Amos church Dromore anniversary, for a son of a former much loved minister in the congregation, was behind the sacred desk, breaking the Bread of Life to the congregation gathered. This fact in itself is something quite rare and the pleasure at being there was mutual to both speaker and audience.

Rev. Douglas Kendall, now pastor of Bondhead United church was the only son of the late Rev. George and Mrs Kendall who served at Dromore and at Knox Church, Normanby, from the years, 1907 to 1914. Thus the son of the Manse was dedicated from his earliest years to the service of the church and though still a youth when his parents left Dromore, his early impressions and memories are strong within as evidenced by his frequent remarks during his discourse.

The audiences on Sunday that Rev. Douglas Kendall addressed were drawn from many outside points as well as from the township's concessions. They came to hear him for his own sake as well as that of his parents and they were not disappointed.

Mr Kendall is a pleasing speaker, fluent in delivery and his gospel sermon in the morning service, based on Jonah sleeping in the hold of the ship while a storm was raging without was a faithful portrayal of the same conditions today.

WILLIAM ALEXANDER SHARP

A death that came as a great shock to family and friends was that of William Alexander Sharp, of 17th con. Normanby on Monday evening last. Alex, apparently had been in the best of health and had remarked to friends the night of Hampden garden party that he had never felt better.

On Monday at 5 p.m. he had taken an early tea with his mother and Mrs Andrew Fulton a close neighbor, at its close remarking he would go to the field and shock a few bushels of barley, also telling his mother he would help after with the chores.

This was the last his mother saw of him in life. On not being home by dark, Mrs Sharp, who was worried, phoned the Fulton home of his non-appearance. The son, Tom Fulton, immediately came over and on going to the grain field, was met by the Sharp dog who merely licked his hand and led him to the spot Alex Sharp lay cold in death. Even the hat still remained on deceased's head and he lay at foot of stook just as he had fallen. It is evident this heart spell came over Alex shortly after entering the grain field, as but forty strokes were placed upright. Dr. Easton, Ayrton, was called and said he had had a sudden but painless death.

Alex Sharp was in his 46th year, and lived his entire life on the farm, where his father predeceased him twelve years ago. He was unmarried and with his mother they lived a happy life together. Alex was a splendid neighbor and friend to have and was respected by the whole neighborhood.

There remain with his mother two brothers, John and George of Durham and one sister Janet, Mrs Gordon Smith, four miles away on the 18th con., Normanby.

The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon to Hampden cemetery, conducted by the Hanover Presbyterian pastor, Rev. Mr. Cleghorn, assisted by a former much esteemed friend and pastor, Rev. W. McLean.

ROBERT H. McNAUGHTON

Relatives at Varney received the sad news last week that the afore said gentleman had passed away on the 30th of July at the hospital in Assiniboia, Sask. Mr. McNaughton had been in rather poor health for several months, suffering from kidney trouble. About six weeks ago he was taken to the hospital in Assiniboia, where he would be nearer to medical skill and treatment. For a time he gained considerably, then complications set in and he became much worse and continued to get weaker until death relieved him of his suffering.

Robert McNaughton was the elder son of the late Lachlan and Margaret McNaughton of Normanby and was in his 72nd year. He spent all the earlier part of his life around the old home now occupied by his brother William. Later he purchased a farm in Bentinck known as "The Forks" where he farmed for several years. Over thirty years ago he sold this farm and went West to Saskatchewan where he worked for a few years then took up a homestead about 70 miles south of Moose Jaw in the locality now called Willows. He was the first settler in that part. His choice of a section proved good and he succeeded well.

Mr McNaughton was twice married his first wife being a Normanby girl (Miss Janet Waters). She predeceased him 17 years ago. Several years later he married Mrs Annie Derbyshire who with one young daughter and two stepsons survive him and will sadly miss a kind and affectionate husband and father.

Mr McNaughton was of a quiet retiring disposition and never sought publicity of any kind. He was a lover of home and home associations, and was much respected by all who knew him. In religion he was a Presbyterian until church union when he joined the United church. Besides his wife and family he is survived by one brother William on the old home and one sister, Janet, Mrs John Kerr of Varney. Another sister (Flora) passed away 16 years ago.
