A Summer's Holiday from the Atlantic to Pacific Coastline

MISS AGNES PETTY IN AN INTERESTING MANNER, DESCRIBES HER SUMMER'S TRIP FROM NEW YORK, THROUGH THE PANAMA CANAL TO CALIFORNIA COAST, AND THENCE TO VICTORIA, B. C.

Our around America trip was a so beautiful, but preferable in some ways. Instead of the mixture of rather varied one, and since a good part of it is in the ordinary line of people were mostly Mexican and travel, I shall confine my story to the more unusual part.

The President Cleveland sails from New York to San Francisco, Honolulu, China, Japan, Manila and back. It was heavily loaded and rode well, there was practically no sickness. The hotel staff was Chinese, the crew a mixture of everything.

After three days we sighted Cuba, which looks so small on a map, but is 819 miles long. We had it in view for three days. The lights along the Malecon Drive made Havana look like a fairy city as we sailed into port late in the evening.

For our morning driver we had a negro with a few knife wounds and a deep chuckle which showed his sense of humor. He treated us to some real negro philosophy, while showing us the loveliest houses; those of ex-presidents and other wealthy men.

In two days more we reached the entrance to the Panama Canal. Everyone was up at sunrise and the view was glorious. The boat had to wait until the company paid \$15,000 toll charge.

The boat docks at Balboa, and Panama City is several miles away. Having from two o'clock until midnight, we immediately secured the inevitable negro and taxi cab, and started out. The port of Panama is very unlike Havana—older, and not nearly

ty, since the water never runs cool. A few days after I left, my uncle tells me a severe storm swept the valley, doing a great deal of damage.

From Los Angeles I travelled the 450 miles to San Francisco by bus, passing first through mountains and then country very much like our part.

The next stop was Midford, Oregon, in the centre of the pear growing country. Here we stayed with my cousin Mrs. Roseborough. They took us into the mountains to see Crater Lake, 8,000 feet above the sea.

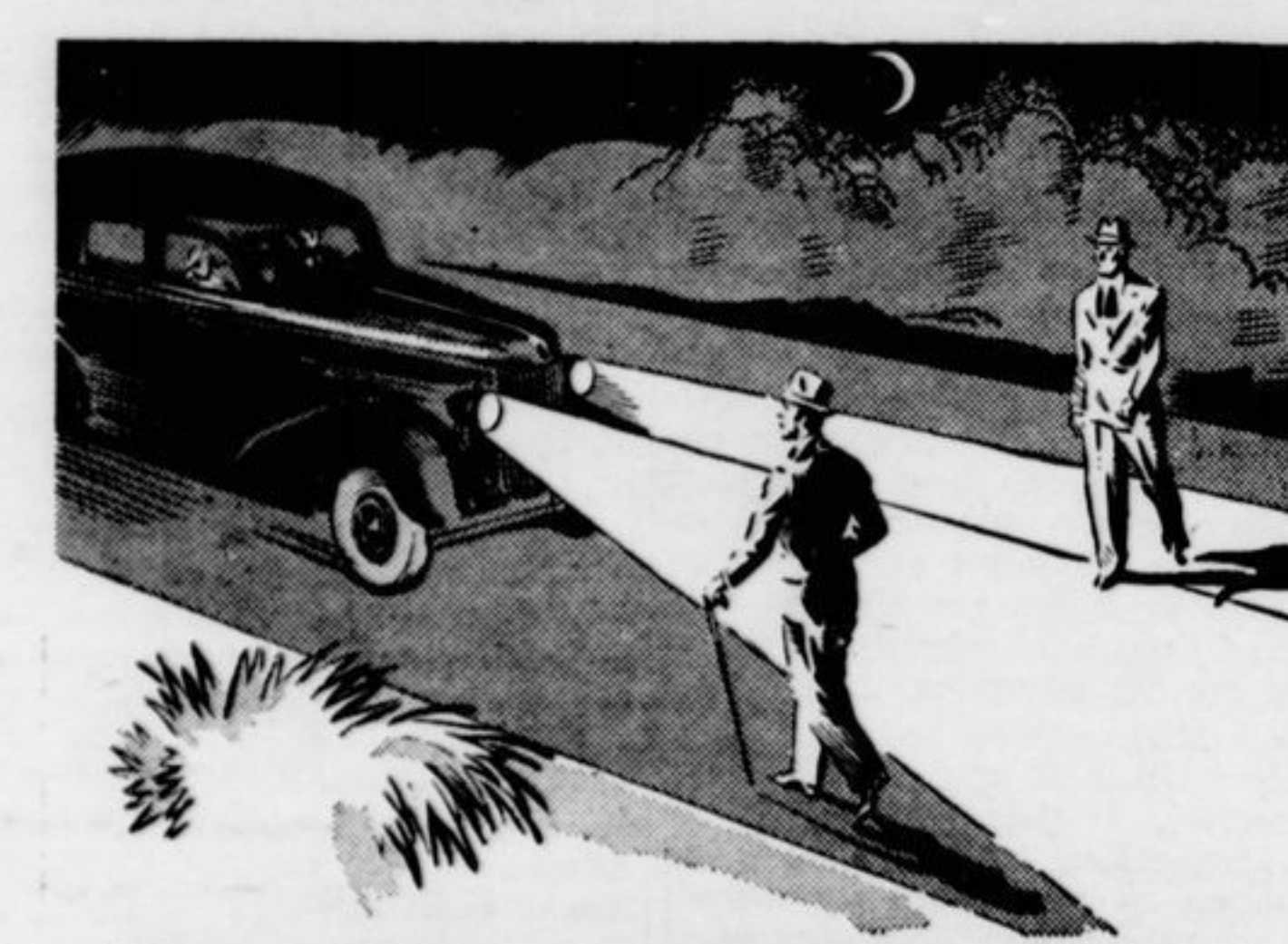
It is an eight day run to Los Angeles and we had rain on all but two—heavy tropical rains, when it "rained all around".

Who wouldn't have misgivings leaving a city at 95 degrees to go to 140 miles into sand hills! The hot winds which blew through the bus windows took one's breath away.

The Coochella Valley, is the only place in America where dates can be grown successfully. There is almost no rainfall, and a plentiful supply of pure artesian water allows for irrigation.

It takes about eight hours to pass through and we were fortunate in having a clear day so the heat wasn't at all oppressive.
