MRS. THOMAS RENWICK

Sorrow and grief entered the home of Thomas Renwick and family, of 18th con., Egremont (near Dromore) when news spread with lightning-like rapidity, that wife and mother, had passed away early Thursday night last. Mrs. Renwick was seventy six years of age, but had enjoyed good health for these seventy six years, and last Thursday had attended Mount Forest Fall Fair with apparently no untoward effect. Shortly after nine p.m. Mr. Renwick and son Alex retired to their beds, leaving Mrs Renwick to finish some reading. On doing so, she also retired, taking lamp up-stairs to her room. She shortly after came downstairs in her night attire, evidently forgetting something, and at the foot of the stairs death overtook her. She was in the morning, found by her son Alex, lying at the foot of the stairs in her last sleep. Death was kind by sparing Mrs Renwick a long illness.

A native of Egremont township, Mrs. Renwick was Mary Ellen Ferguson, daughter of the late John and Isabelle Ferguson, born on the farm now managed by Erwin Ferguson of the 17th con. She is the last of her family. Fifty years ago in March of this year, she was wedded to Thomas Renwick and the union has proved a happy one. The first six years of their wedded life were spent in Proton, and the other forty-four have been at their present abode. Seven children were born to them, one son Christopher of the 146th Battalion paying the supreme sacrifice overseas in 1918. The other members are: Percy, Holland, Man., Nettie, Mrs J. McNeil, Fairlight, Sask.; Amanda, Mrs. Sam Patterson, Egremont; Wilfrid, near his old home; Miss Florence of Dunnville. There are as well twelve grandchildren.

Mrs. Renwick carried wherever she went, the love and respect of a wide circle of friends, who mourn with her family in life's sudden termination. Her life was made up of little kindly acts, that now bring tender memories to the fore. She was a loyal member of Amos church, Dromore, where service was conducted Monday by Rev. Robt.
