# Here and There

Cutstanding success has attended the publication of J. Murray Gibbon's book, "Steel of Empire, in which is told the history of transportation in this country. The first edition of this comprehensive and finely illustrated work on Canada's history was sold early and another is now out in preparation for sale as Christmas gifts, for which it is anticipated there will be a heavy de-Effective January 1, 1937, contributory pensions for Canadian Pacific employees will replace the 33-year-old non-contributory

system. Since the latter system's inception in 1903, the railway has paid out \$18,201,640 in pensions. Under the new plan, officers and employees will contribute three per cent. of their wages or salaries. Pension rates will be unchanged and pensioning age will be the same as heretofore. Twenty-three arrivals from

British and continental ports and twenty-three departures by Canadian Pacific liners will constitute the passenger service from Saint John and Halifax during the coming winter season, it is announced from company headquarters. Season will commence November 28 and close in mid-April.
