HOLSTEIN HYDRO RESERVES AND SURPLUS GROWS

Holstein's total of Hydro reserves and surplus is entered in the latest Provincial Hydro report at \$6,786, itemized as follows: Reserve for equity in Provincial Hydro system \$1,788; reserve for Jereprietion on local plant, \$1,353; debentures paid, \$2,762; and operating surplus, \$882. The total number of Holstein Hydro users stands at 73 as against 41 in 1917; horsepower used last year was 15.6 as against 6.4 in 1917; total revenue last year was \$2,255 compared with but \$634 in 1917; lighting revenue \$1,818 against \$488 19 years ago; kilowatt hours sold for lighting 17,051 last year, and 5,038 in 1917; and plant capital is now valued at \$3,594 as compared with \$2,292 in 1917.
