Streamlining locomotives, according to engineers, is only the outward symbol of the radical changes which are taking place in railroad rolling stock as modernization programs proceed. With industry advancing into the age of alloys, entirely new materials which give greater strength and ruggedness are being used. In this field, Canadian nickel is an alloying material with steel is being used in new railroad equipment throughout the whole world as well as in Canada. An interesting historical point is the fact that the discovery of Canada's nickel resources was originally made when the line of the Canadian Pacific was being pushed through the Sudbury district. Now, years later, the metal discovered then, is a vital factor in the development of better rail services. TOP, a trio of the giant C.N.R. 6400's, reported as the world's largest streamlined locomotives in which Canadian nickel is used extensively; BOTTOM, one of the new Canadian semi-streamlined trains in service.

Original "Mountie" Has Unique Record

Dr. Braithwaite Longer on R.C. M.P. Rolls Than Any Other Living Man

EDMONTON—Clear-eyed and more vigorous as the years roll by, Dr. E. A. Braithwaite can point to a police record unique in Canadian history. His name appeared on Royal Canadian Mounted Police payrolls longer than any other member of the force, living or dead.
Celebrating the 40th anniversary of his appointment as Alberta coroner he recalls the historic trek of Colonel Irvine's mounted troops from Regina to Duck Lake for the relief of Fort Carlton in the Northwest rebellion of 1885. He was an eye-witness to the execution of Louis Riel, leader of a Metis uprising for a native north-west.
"Doc" Braithwaite was medical attendant on that memorable 375-mile march. He enlisted with the Northwest Mounted Police at Regina on his arrival from England in 1884, and remained on the payroll of the force 47 years and eight months. He held the position of honorary surgeon until December 31, 1931.
Son of an Anglican minister, he was born in Yorkshire and attended United Service College at Westward Ho. Here he once protected a stranger lad from punishment at the hands of school bullies. The name of the boy was Rudyard K. ling.
Back in 18993 he was called on Lac Ste. Anne, north of here, to perform a post-mortem on the body of an Indian brave, victim of murder.

Bread and Cheese Now Come in Cans

LIVERPOOL, Eng. — This is the canning age. In 1930 the canned foods consumed in England ran to 50,000,000 tins. Last year they had grown to 672,000,000 tins.
Most interesting and most successful experiments have been made. Today they are canning bread and cheese and beer; not altogether, of course, as a sort of mid-day "snack" but each in its airtight tin as victuals inviolable to decay until the necessity of the tin-opener arises. The successful canning of bread is very significant, it is believed.
Gas warfare would mean the contamination of food, for even the best refrigerator is not airtight. It may mean survival and salvation to a war-stricken area that can rely on such a source of supply.

Great Names On Old Church Books

HALIFAX—Sited in what is now the heart of the business section of Halifax, St. Paul's Anglican Church, the oldest Protestant Church in Canada, constructed in 1750, has been visited by many noted people down through the years.
On the pages of the visitors' book placed in the vestry by the clergy, can be found the names of royalty, statesmen, poets and admirals of the years gone by. Among the distinguished persons whose names are enrolled are those of King Edward VII, then a prince, King Edward VIII, as Prince of Wales, Admiral Jellicoe, Commander Alenby, Sir Charles Tupper, Lord Willingdon, Bliss Carmen, Sir Sanford Fleming, and many others. To scan the pages of the book is to review the history of this garrison city.
St. Paul's has a memento of the Halifax explosion of 1917. The concussion of the blast splintered a window in the church and the glass that remains in the frame resembles closely the profile of the first reactor of this historic church.

Women's Work In Past Ages Has Been Sunk In Oblivion

NEW YORK—The necessity for establishing a separate centre in which documents relating to the activities of women throughout history would be kept was stressed recently by Mrs. Mary R. Beard, the author and historian.
"One would never know, Mrs. Beard said, "the women have been in science, medicine, politics, and philosophy throughout the years. Until the arrival of social history men taught history as being a series of conflicts of power in which women were non-existent. Women, never having known themselves, having nothing to oppose to 'his theory'.
"Archives concerning women are scattered all over the world," she said, "so that no student can ever go to the trouble of looking them up. Our job is to bring as many as possible of these documents together under one roof and in charge of women who will know how to take good care of them. Our aim at present is to raise money with which to construct a building as world centre for women's archives."

Relief Problems Of The Unemployed To Be Investigated

OTTAWA—Arthur Purvis, chairman of the National Employment Commission, announced recently the commission had obtained, through cooperation of the Canadian Welfare Council, the services of Miss Charlotte Whitton, the council's executive director.
Miss Whitton, whose services will be temporary, Mr. Purvis said, will make a special investigation into the phases of unemployment relief problem which relates to co-ordination of Government and voluntary agencies for relief and social services.

Many Pilots Join Royal Air Force

LONDON, Eng. — Nearly 2,500 pilots who were formerly in civil life and more than 20,000 "other ranks" have joined the service during the 18 months that have elapsed since the first expansion program was announced for the Royal Air Force.
Delivery of aircraft is going ahead and formation is announced of two new R.A.F. groups to take over executive control of 10 service stations. Two more stations are listed for early opening, and "high altitude" bombing ranges revealed.
The Langford Fort range may now be brought into general use during the hours of daylight, it is announced. The range at Dalgety Bay is being converted to provide general facilities for "high altitude" bombing during the hours of daylight, by units using practice bombs only. It became available for use December 1. The two new groups are styled Reconnaissance and Training.
