The following accounts were passed and payments ordered: Durham Review, on printing contract \$100.00; payment voucher No. 1, for work performed on roads \$96.39; Grey & Bruce Insurance Co., 3rd instalment insurance on township buildings \$7.10; Markdale Standard, advertising accounts \$6.50; Clerk, competing 2 applications for pension \$4.

Relief accounts as follows: Armstrong Dairy \$2.80; Markdale Farmers' Co-operative Ltd \$14.05; Thibadeau's butcher shop \$2.30; Frank D'Arcy, services relief and telephoning \$3.20.

The Clerk was instructed to advertise for crushing and hauling 5000 yards gravel for 1937. Wm. Banks was given contract of 1 cord of 20 inch hardwood for Tp. Hall at \$3.00.

It was decided to order 8 copies of Municipal World for 1937.

D'Arcy-Robinson: That the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign the petition for statutory grant on expenditure on Township Roads in 1936 and forward same to the Dept. of Highways.

Robinson-D'Arcy: That Council meetings in 1937 be held as follows: the first Saturday in February, March, April, May, June, July, August, Sept. October and Nov. 15th, Dec. 11th. Board of Health meetings to be held at 1 p.m. on the last Thursday in January, May, August and November.

Bylaw No. 802 was sustained by resolution, confirming appointment of Robert G. Peart as Assessor for 1937 at a salary of \$90.

The Council adjourned to Saturday Feb. 6th at 10 a.m. to receive auditors' report and for general business.
