Miami, Florida, Jan. 30, 1937.

Sunday morning dawned another glorious day. I awoke early, got up and sat by the window.

It was too glorious a morning to waste away. I went for a short walk before breakfast and right after, we left for church.

We had a lovely service by Bishop Flint who was assisted by his son, a visitor from Long Island.

Directly after we came home from church, we packed our lunch and went to Bayfront park.

One afternoon during the week an Italian with a hand organ and a little monkey dressed up as a gentleman came along the street.

We had our lunch under a banyan tree, Florida's most remarkable tree, which sprouts even from a seed dropped on the limb of any other tree by birds.

I heard a very interesting thing about royal palms the other day. A Spanish royal family, exiled from their native land, chose Florida as their adopted country.

There are many lovely flower bordered paths, some winding along the shore, others cool and shady under the palms.

Following one of these charming paths we wandered along until we came to the Venus Valdemar, a ship which was blown right on the road during the hurricane several years ago.
