### MRS. THOMAS BROWN

The body of the late Mrs. Thomas Brown was brought to Durham Monday last to lie among the people with whom she was so long identified in life. Despite advancing years and the pressure by her family, to take things earlier, Mrs. Brown found her highest reward in being useful. For many years since widowed, she was the faithful homemaker for John Gray Bunnass, who died in October last. After his death, she has made her home with her daughter at Duluth, Wisconsin, where she died. She was 81 years of age.

Previous to her marriage, Mrs. Brown was Emma Atkinson and in 1878, was married to Thomas Brown, where Mr. Noble was a sawyer in the Brigham saw mill. Five years later they moved to the 50 acres on the gravel road now owned by David Connelly, and Mr. Noble continued with his work in the mill until he had completed 25 years as sawyer. Three years after his father's death, Mr. Noble purchased the Noble homestead on the 3rd concession of Bentinck, W.G.K., just south of Huton Hill and moved his family there in 1905. In 1923 Mr and Mrs. Noble retired from farm life and moved to Durham to their home on Bruce st. and the farm was taken over by their son, Reuben.

While in Bentinck Mr Noble served for a number of years on the township council and took an active part in school education by serving on the trustee board of Huton Hill School.

Mr. Noble was born in Bentinck on Dec. 25th, 1853, a member of the large family of Mr and Mrs George Noble. Mr. Noble has one sister and five brothers surviving, Lydia, Mrs. Charles Lawrence; Joseph, Frederick, William and Arnold all in this vicinity and John in Owen Sound.

Mrs. Noble, who was formerly Eliza M. Atkins was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs Wm. Atkins and was born on Feb. 4th, 1856 in the township of Brant in Bruce County. Mrs Atkins was also a member of a large family and today only one sister survives. Mr and Mrs Reay north of Durham. Mrs Noble is an active member of the Women's Guild of Trinity Anglican church, the church of which Mr and Mrs Noble are members.

Mrs. Haves of Meaford was at the funeral also. The following is a clipping from a Toronto newspaper: "With the burial in Prospect Cemetery on Feb. 3rd of Mrs. Matthew S. Brandon of Tottenham, Ont. the saddest three weeks in the history of the Menzies family comes to an end. The first family tragedy occurred on Jan. 11th when Mrs. Jessie Rose died suddenly at her home in Tottenham. Mrs. Rose was a sister of David Menzies of 447 Gladstone Ave., who for over 40 years has been one of Toronto's best known plumbers. She was laid to rest in the family plot in Prospect Cemetery. A short time after his sister's funeral, David Menzies was taken ill. He was in his 69th year, but had always been in splendid health and still took an active interest in his business. ## Durham Won District Honors: Beat Olympics 3-2

Though Durham's O.H.A. Int. Provincial champions may or may not make the rocky grade again this year, they at least again are district champions as a result of a gruelling win here Wednesday night 3-2, over Owen Sound Olympics. As first game in O. Sound was also Durham's by same margin, 5-4 the locals win the round 8 to 6 in two straight, and are profoundly grateful no third game will be necessary in Walkerton on Friday.

With ice inclined to stickiness after a short time, a withering pace was kept up most of the game, and neither team could pierce the tight defence. There was little vantage, and the first frame went scoreless.

With Blair off in second-for tripping Moses, Cassidy broke the ice for Durham when he banged in Dean's rebound, and 1 minute later Nicholls tied it up when he raced in on McDonald, unchecked. Durham assumed the lead when Dean took Schutz's pass to beat Neath, and second ended 2-1, for Durham.

In final period, it was nip and tuck. Both teams were tiring, but the Olympics were fresher than Durham and held a slight edge. However a pretty Rennie to Moses play put Durham 2 up, and the visitors battled all the harder. Flint scored No. 2 for Olympics on a shot from blue line which never left ice, but slipped in off McDonald's skate. Rennie next scored for Durham, making it 4-2, but at same time an O.S. player knocked nets over, and the goal went uncounted. Durham held the fort to the end and the final gong was a welcome sound.

Both McDonald and Neath in nets turned in sensational saves and were the outstanding players. Referee Houston of Harriston, handled a splendid game. Durham will likely get in semi-finals early next week, with Elora or Fergus probable opponents.

Durham fans breathed easier however when Elvidge netted a smart goal at end of 2nd to give Durham a 5-3 lead. In last period, play slowed up somewhat with tiring athletes, and no goals came until a lucky batted puck by Lamson a minute before close, brought Owen Sound's total to 4.

The season's biggest crowd in O. Sound, over 1400 paid, saw lots of action but no sustained outstanding play. Referee Teasdale gave plenty of penalties 17 in all, with Durham drawing 9. Blair and Soup Campbell looked the Olympics stars with the
