

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

LESSON XIII.
JOHN'S RECOLLECTIONS OF THE RISEN LORD—John 20: 19-29; 21: 20-24.
GOLDEN TEXT—I am the first and the last, and the Living One; and I was dead, and behold, I am alive for evermore. Revelation 1: 17, 18.

THE PLAN OF LESSON.
TIME—The resurrection itself occurred on Sunday, April 9, A.D. 30. The appearance to Thomas occurred the Sunday following, April 16, A.D. 30. The appearance at the Sea of Galilee occurred within thirty days after this, but we do not know exactly when.
PLACE—The resurrection of Christ and his appearance to Mary Magdalene took place just outside the city wall in the garden near the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea; the two appearances to the disciples occurred in an upper room in Jerusalem. All the events recorded in chapter 21 took place on the shore of the Sea of Tiberias.

"When therefore it was evening, on that day, the first day of the week," Between the Lord's appearance to Mary Magdalene early in the morning and his appearance to the two disciples that evening, two other appearances must be placed, though they are not given in John's Gospel, the appearance to Simon Peter (Luke 24: 34; I Cor. 15: 5), and the memorable journey with two disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24). "And when the doors were shut, where the disciples were," It is not said how many were present. Jesus was dead and Thomas was absent. Probably the other ten were present. "For fear of the Jews," (I. John 7:13.) Rumors of the resurrection had been spread and it was as yet uncertain what "they" the popular leaders would adopt. Jesus' came and stood in the midst." How the Lord entered the room John does not tell us. The record assumes that his entrance was miraculous, and that it was not necessary for the doors to be unlocked and opened to admit him into their presence. Jesus came upon them in such a way as to prove that new laws now ruled his body, that the earth no longer was a limitation to it. "And said unto them, Peace be unto you." This was the ordinary greeting of one Jew to another; it was Christ's last word to his disciples in their sorrow before his Passion (John 16: 23). Now they had a new peace, in the confidence that man's greatest enemy, death, had been defeated, and that the one who had the keys of life and death was none other than their friend, servant and master.

"And when he had said this, he showed unto them his hands and his side." The disciples therefore were glad, when they saw the Lord." Our Lord did this to convince his disciples that he was the very same person who had been crucified and that he had risen with the same body in which he had died, as the parallel account in Luke (24: 39) indicates, it is I myself.
 "Jesus therefore said to them again, Peace be unto you; as the Father hath sent me, even so send I you." (See John 17: 2, 23.) Christ had finished the work which the Father had given him to do on earth in his own persons; henceforth he would speak through others. The new commission is wider than the earlier one. (Matt. 10: 1-12, etc.), for it is not limited to the apostolate; the other disciples who were present are included, and with the eleven, they represent the whole church.
 "And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said unto them, Receive ye the Holy Spirit." Christ's breathing upon the same body in which he had died, as the parallel account in Luke (24: 39) indicates, it is I myself.

cept I shall see in his hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." Thomas certainly was not afraid of being convinced that his Lord had arisen; on the contrary, he sought to be convinced that his Lord had arisen; on the contrary, he sought to be convinced of this and put himself in the way of conviction. He had doubted because he wished to believe. It is this which distinguishes Thomas and all right-minded doubters from thorough-going and depraved unbelievers.

"And after eight days." That is, the following Sunday night, April 16. "Again his disciples were within, and Thomas with them. Jesus cometh, the doors being shut, and stood in the midst, and said, Peace be unto you." The fact that Thomas was present with the disciples indicates that he did not deliberately shun fellowship with those who were confident that Christ had come forth from the dead.
 "Then saith he to Thomas, Reach hither thy finger, and see my hands; and reach hither thy hand, and put it into my side; and be not faithless, but believing." The Lord is always willing to convince doubters of the reality of divine truth by every legitimate means.

"Thomas answered and said unto him, My Lord and my God." Most commentators believe that Thomas never accepted the invitation of Christ to reach forth his hand and put it into his side. He believed at once. The confession that came from the lips of Thomas was the most advanced ever made by any of the twelve during the time they were with Jesus.
 "Jesus saith unto him, Because thou hast seen me, thou hast believed; blessed are they that have not seen, and yet have believed. Such conditions as Thomas required are unnecessary in order to have true and intelligent faith. Thomas himself ought to have believed in the testimony of the rest, convinced by all he had known and experienced of Christ in past days. Our Lord does not mean that faith has not its solid reasons for faith is not blind acceptance of truth, nor the opposite of sight because it asserts what is not seen.
 "Peter, turning about, saith to the disciple whom Jesus loved following; who also leaned back on his breast at the supper, and said, Lord, who is he that betrayeth thee? Peter therefore seeing him saith to Jesus, Lord, and what shall this man do? The same irrepressible Peter was not subdued into silence by the suggestion of his own end. The question indicates the natural wish to know the future of a friend, all the more natural after having been told something about his own future.
 "Jesus saith unto him, If I will that he tarry till I come, what is that to thee? follow thou me. This saying therefore went forth among the brethren, that that disciple should not die; yet Jesus said not unto him, that he should not die; but, If I will that he tarry till I come, what is that to thee? Jesus speaks as one who is Lord of life and death, whose will is supreme in earth and heaven. He also asserts the fact of his Second Coming.

"This is the disciple that heareth witness of these things, and wrote these things." The phrase may refer to the whole contents of the Gospel. "And we know that his witness is true." We probably refer to the Christians who surrounded John at Ephesus, who, having lived personally with John, know his sincerity and declare him incapable of relating anything false. The Gospel closes with a simple statement reminding us that its contents cover only a small portion of all the many things which Jesus did.

Shells For Britain Made in Hamilton

Ottawa.—Manufacture of 50,000 shells for the new universal gun being adopted by the British Army, and involving an expenditure of approximately \$1,000,000 will be undertaken by the National Steel Car Company of Hamilton, Ont., Major K. S. Mackenzie, of the Royal Artillery, Woolwich, said here recently.
 Major Mackenzie said he is in Canada to inspect the shells. Three civilians had been sent from England on the same mission and are now in Hamilton.

Still 8,399,000 U.S. Unemployed

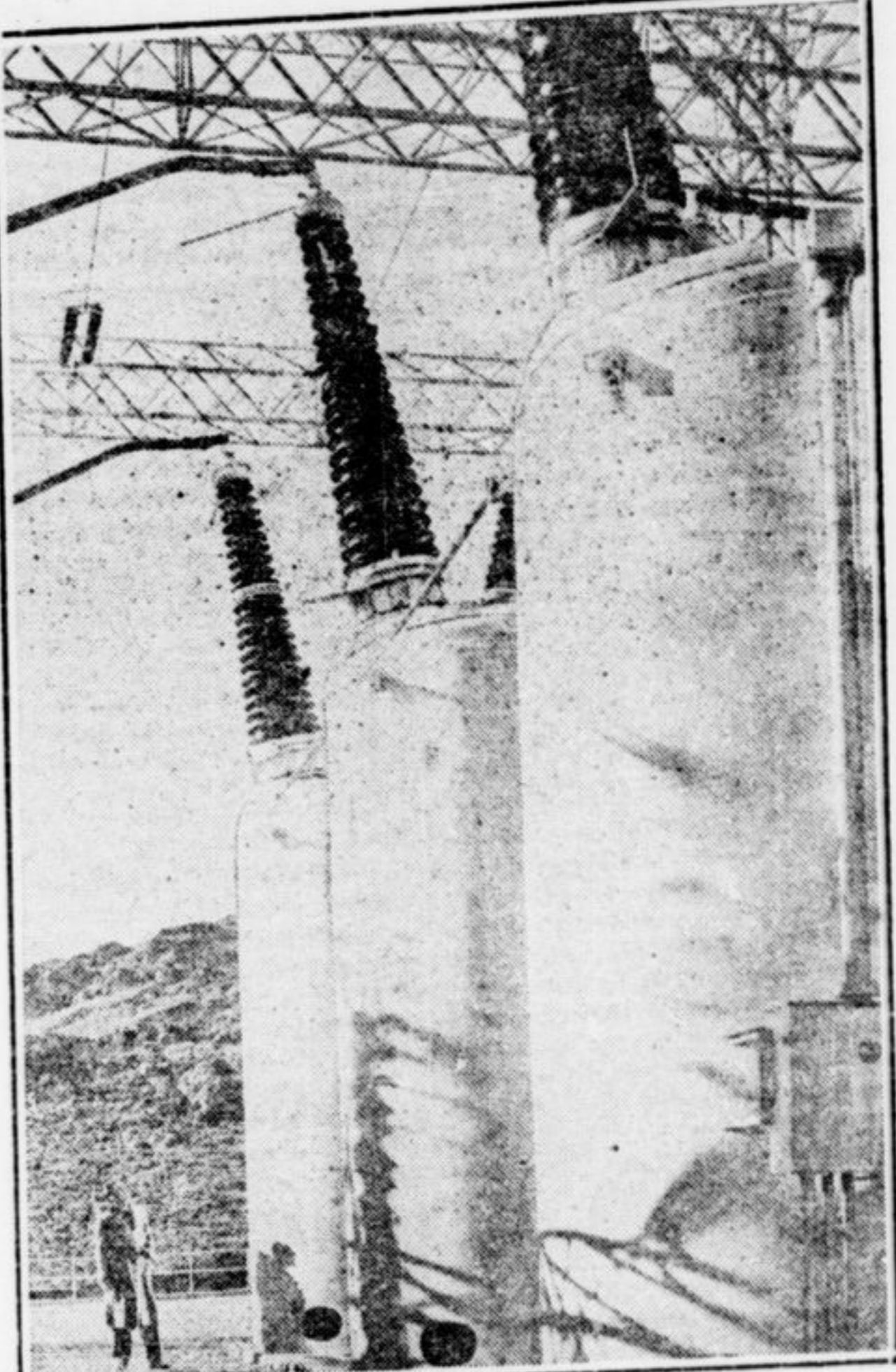

Monument To Power



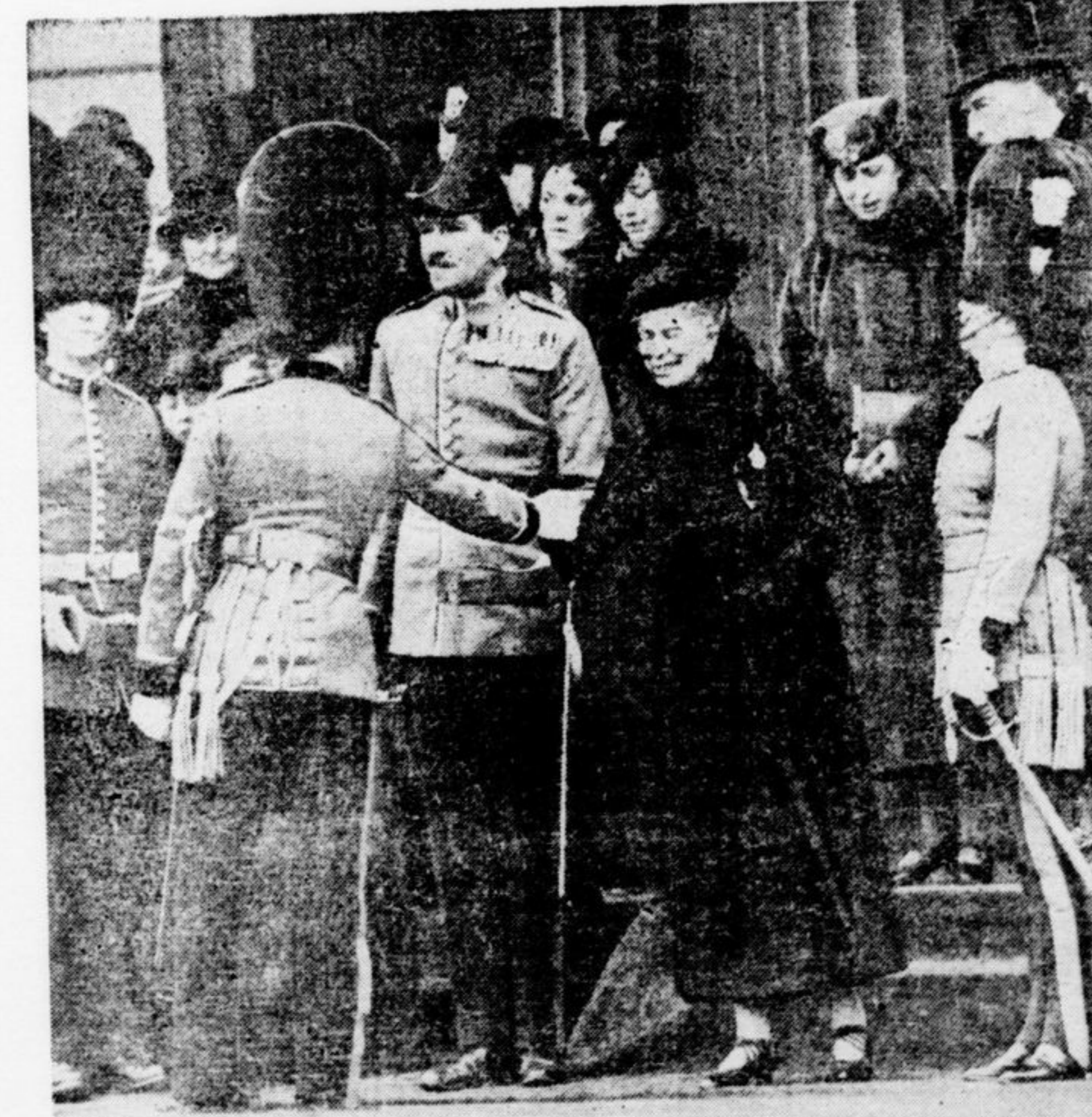

The Bridge Cards You Play With

Tonight, and every Saturday night, is bridge night for a great many people in this and every other community observes the St. Thomas Times-Journal. So perhaps it will interest you to know what the characters on the cards stand for.

The actual origin of cards is lost in obscurity, but they were known in France about 1350 and a special suit was painted to amuse Charles VI who was a bit "nutty." That was why kings, queens and knaves came to be on the cards, the knaves presumably being the fawning court attendants who hung onto the court. Actually, two of the queens are from Greek mythology and two from the Bible. The queen of clubs is Judith (representative of courage) the lady who made a date with Holofernes and then cut off his head while he was asleep; the lady with the diamonds is Rachel (pity); Juno, the girl friend of Jupiter, stands for majesty; as the queen of hearts and Pallas Minerva, the goddess of the arts and crafts for spades. The original portraits were Queen Marie of Anjou; Isabeau, the mother of Charles VII; Agnes Sorel, who was Arc. The packs were first intended to be portraits of knights of romance such as Lancelot, one of the knights of the court of King Arthur; the national Danish hero, Holger Danske, the son of Geoffrey, King of Denmark, and other worthy fellows with poetic names like Wigalois, Pharamond, Yvain.

The "pips" originally stood for different classes. The club is a three-leaf clover and diamonds are folk who till the land; spades stand for the masons and craftsmen generally; hearts are the symbol of the priests and those who attend to our spiritual wellbeing, and the good side of the head of an ancient pipe, and, of course, represent the fighting men.
 Bridge had almost supplanted every other card game, but for many decades the universal game was whist, which is still played by probably more people in the Old Country than is bridge. Tallyrand it is who said: "You do not play at whist, sir? Alas, what a sad old age you are preparing for yourself." Without cards this would be a dull world for millions of people. But many—especially the Indies it is to be feared—overdo the bridge fetish, and they should remember the words of Garrick: "Cards were first for benefits designed, sent to amuse, not to enslave the mind."

Washing of Foods Safeguards Health

Best Precautions Against Disease Dirt and Sprays Used by Growers
 Do you wash all the fruits and vegetables for the baby and the children?
 It seems that one should, because of bugs. Not that we eat the bugs, but because they eat the fruit and vegetables. That is, unless the farmers and gardeners use sprays for plants and trees with pesticides that are injurious to bodies as well as insects. "But," you exclaim indignantly, "why do they do it? My grandfather had a farm and I never so much as saw him spray a weed. The children picked off the potato bugs and he sprinkled ashes or something over the cucumber vines, but as for poison, he never thought of such a thing."
 Which is true of all our grandfathers. But if they lived today they would have to do what nearly every other grower must do, either use insect-sprays to keep down the pests or give up farming. Because destructive insects have increased in recent years in uncounted bodies, and there is no choice. Either we eat, by destroying the destroyers first, or we don't eat at all.
 These sprays do not, of course, touch the fruit itself, or the product of the plant or vine, because spraying is done early in the season. The food surfaces may pick up a little here and there from ground or later labor.

No one will eat an unwashed apple or tomato and fall down dead, or even get sick. It isn't as bad as all that. It is just that certain chemicals are not good for us in a general way, and a little bit of foreign substance, finding its way to our stomachs, after a period of time may result in "accumulation," meaning that instead of being passed out of the system, it stays there. And every little bit added to what you've got just makes a little bit more. Not so good for health.

Doctors Urge Precaution.
 Doctors today are urging patients more strongly than ever to wash all raw foods. It is so easy to put them into a big pan of water and let them soak off any injurious substances that may happen to cling.
 Best to be on the safe side, especially as it is so little trouble. Anyway, the very handling of produce by so many people before it reaches the kitchen makes this a fine precaution.
