LESSON XIII.  
JOHN'S RECOLLECTIONS OF THE  
—RISEN LORD—John 20: 19-29;  
21: 20-24.

GOLDEN TEXT—I am the first and  
the last, and the Living one; and  
I was dead, and behold, I am alive  
for evermore. Revelation 1: 17,  
18.

### THE PLAN OF LESSON

TIME.—The resurrection itself occurred on Sunday, April 9, A.D. 30. The appearance to Thomas occurred the Sunday following, April 16, A.D. 30. The appearance at the Sea of Galilee occurred within thirty days after this, but we do not know exactly when.

PLACE.—The resurrection of Christ and his appearance to Mary Magdalene took place just outside the city wall in the garden near the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea; the two appearances to the disciples occurred in an upper room in Jerusalem. All the events recorded in chapter 21 took place on the shore of the Sea of Tiberias.

"When therefore it was evening, on that day, the first day of the week," Between the Lord's appearance to Mary Magdalene early in the morning and his appearance to the ten disciples that evening, two other appearances must be placed, though they are not given in John's Gospel, the appearance to Simon Peter (Luke 24: 34; 1 Cor. 15: 5), and the memorable journey with two disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24). "And when the doors were shut where the disciples were." It is not said how many were present. Jesus was dead and Thomas was absent. Probably the other ten were present. "For fear of the Jews" (cf. John 7:13.) Reminders of the resurrection had been spread and it was as yet uncertain what other popular leaders would adopt. "Jesus came and stood in the midst." How the Lord entered, the reader John does not tell us, the record assumes that his entrance was miraculously, and that it was not necessary for the doors to be unlocked and opened to admit him into their presence. Jesus came among them in such a way as to prove that new laws now ruled His body, that the earthly no longer was a limitation to it. "And I said unto them, Peace be unto you." This was the ordinary greeting of one Jew to another; it was Christ's last word to his disciples in their sorrow before his Ascension (John 16: 23). Now they had a new peace, in the confidence that many's greatest enemy, death, had been defeated, and that the one who had the keys of life and death was none other than their friend, servant and master.

"And when he had said this, he showed unto them his hands and his side. The disciples therefore were glad, when they saw the Lord." Our Lord did this to convince his disciples that he was the very same person who had been crucified and that he had risen with the same body in which he had died, as the parallel account in Luke (24: 39) indicates. It is I myself.

"Jesus saith unto them, If I will that he tarry till I come, what is that to thee? follow thou me. This saying therefore went forth among the brethren, that that disciple should not die; yet Jesus said not unto him, that he should not die; but, if I will that he tarry till I come, what is that to thee?" Jesus speaks as one who is Lord of life and death, whose will is supreme in earth and heaven. He also asserts the fact of his Second Coming.

"This is the disciple that beareth witness of these things, and wrote these things." The phrase may refer to the whole contents of the Gospel. "And we know that his witness is true." We probably refers to the Christians who surrounded John at Ephesus, who, having lived personally with John, know his sincerity and declare him incapable of relating anything false. The Gospel closes with a simple statement reminding us that its contents cover only a small portion of all the many things which Jesus did.

### Shells For Britain Made in Hamilton

Ottawa.—Manufacture of 50,000 shells for the new universal gun being adopted by the British Army, and involving an expenditure of approximately \$1,000,000 will be undertaken by the National Steel Car Company of Hamilton, Ont., Major K. S. MacKenzie, of the Royal Artillery, Woolwich, said here recently.

Major MacKenzie said he is in Canada to inspect the shells. Three civilians had been sent from England on the same mission and are now in Hamilton.


### Still 8,399,000 U.S. Unemployed

### The Bridge Cards You Play With

Tonight, and every Saturday night, is bridge night for a great many people in this and every other community observes the St. Thomas Times-Journal. So perhaps it will interest you to know what the characters on the cards stand for.

The actual origin of cards is lost in obscurity, but they were known in France about 1530 and a special set was painted to amuse Charles VI who was a bit "natty." That was why kings, queens and knaves came to be on the cards, the knaves presumably being the tawny elephants who hung unto the court. Actually, two or the queens are from Greek mythology and two from the Bible. The queen of clubs is Judith (representative of courage) the lady who made a date with Holofernes and then cut off his head while he was asleep; the lady with the diamonds is Rachel (piety); Juno, the girl friend of Jupiter, stands for modesty as the queen of hearts and Pallas Minerva, the goddess of arts and crafts for spades. The original portraits were Queen Marie of Anjou; Isabella, the mother of Charles VII; Agnes Sorel, who was Charles' weakness, and Joan of Arc. The cards were first intended to be portraits of knights of romance such as Lancelot, one of the knights of the court of King Arthur; the national Danish hero, Holger Danske, the son of Geoffrey, King of Denmark, and other worthy fellows with poetic names like Wiglaf, Pharamond, Twain.

The "pips" originally stood for different classes. The club is a three leaf clover and represents the folks who till the land; diamonds are really lozenge shaped stones and stand for the masons and craftsmen generally; hearts are the symbol of priests and those who attend to our spiritual wellbeing, and the good old spade is the head of an ancient pike, and, of course, represent the fighters.

"But," you exclaim indignantly, "why do they do it? My grandfather had a farm and I never so much as saw him spray a weed. The children picked off the potato bugs and he sprinkled ashes or something over the cucumber vines, but as far as I can tell, he never thought of such a thing."

Which is true of all our grandfathers. But if they lived today they would have to do what nearly every other grower must do, either use insect-sprays to keep down the pests or give up farming. Because destructive insects have increased in recent years in uncounted hordes, and there is no choice. Either we eat by destroying the destroyers first, or we don't eat at all.

These sprays do not, of course, touch the fruit itself, or the product of plant or vine, because spraying is done early in the season, and food surfaces may pick up a little here and there from ground or tree later on.

No one will eat an unwashed apple or tomato and fall down dead, or even get sick. It isn't as bad as all that. It is just that certain chemicals are not good for us in a general way, and a little bit of foreign substance, finding its way to the stomach, after a period of time may result in "accumulation," meaning that instead of being passed out of the system, it stays there. And every little bit added to what you've got just makes a little bit more. Not so good for health.

**Doctors Urge Precaution.**

Doctors today are urging patients more strongly than ever to wash all raw foods. It is so easy to put them into a big pan of water and let them soak off any injurious substances that may happen to cling.
