Two Months' Sentence. Pleading guilty to a charge of keeping liquor for sale, David Thomson of Durham was sentenced to two months in jail when he appeared before Magistrate E. C. Sperman in police court at Owen Sound last Friday morning.

Mrs. Aaron Wenger Dead. Mrs. Janet Philip Wenger, widow of Aaron Wenger of Aytun, died at her home, 194 Medland St., Toronto, on Monday.

Discussing the decrease in funded debt, experts agree that it has been accompanied by a change in carrying charges even more revolutionary than the turning over from a 1936 deficit of \$12,999,999 to a staggering surplus. It is pointed out that in the fiscal year ending in 1934, 46.62 cents out of every dollar of revenue was required to meet the interest account. Now, less than 26 cents out of the revenue dollar is necessary for this purpose, which means that instead of 57 cents remaining for the benefit of the people, there is available a sum of 74 cents.

Get Letter From Queen. In the midst of multitudinous duties arising out of the Coronation, England's new queen is not forgetting her loyal subjects overseas. The parents of the pastor of Crawford United church, Rev. T. F. Heaney, were recently gladdened by a line of congratulation from Queen Elizabeth, on their attaining their 61st wedding anniversary, at their home in West Oxford township.

A 15 pound Coronation Baby. In Sarnia hospital last Wednesday—Coronation Day—a 15 pound boy—John Albert—was born to Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Thompson, wife of the Rev. J. R. Thompson, rector of St. Paul's Anglican church, Point Edward, formerly of Durham. Two other babies were born that day in the same hospital and were named after the King and Queen.

Presentation in London. On Friday evening of last week the members of All Saints' Anglican church, London, gathered at the home of Mrs. Reginald Bunt, to pay farewell tribute to Rev. Carman J. Queen, assistant curate at All Saints, who is leaving at the end of this month. Canon A. A. Bice, on behalf of the congregation, spoke very highly of Carman and presented him with a lovely silver plated private communion set, as a mark of their esteem and appreciation.

A Mean Robbery. There are various robberies: some of them are brazen while others are essence of meanness. A robbery of the flags and other decorative matter up for Coronation Day at Edge Hill school, comes under the latter class. Miss Dorothy Ritchie, (at her own expense), teacher, had decorated the porch of the schoolhouse on Monday with flags and streamers and on Tuesday morning there was no sign of a flag. It is felt that it was not the work of anybody in the section, but rather of some passing motorist, who must be proud of his brave deed.

1938 Markers Royal Blue, Scarlet. Ontario's 1938 license plates will reach a new high in brilliance, it was learned when Hon. Harry Nixon, provincial secretary, received a sample of the markers. The background color is royal blue with scarlet letters. A royal crown in scarlet divides the figure 1938, set above the license number.

C. A. Fleming an Honored Citizen. A citizen of whom Owen Sound has reason to be proud, is C. A. Fleming, who has attained his 80th birthday in fair health and excellent spirits. Mr. Fleming's business career is interwoven with the growth and expansion of the city and the tributes tendered him on his recent birthday, by his friends in public, lodge and private life, are many and sincere. The Rotary Club, of which he is a member, presented him with a 400-day clock.

I.O.O.F. Lodges at Trinity Church

The annual church service for Grey Lodge I.O.O.F. and Lady Grey Rebekah Lodge was held Sunday evening at Trinity church. Including visiting brethren and sisters from Palmerston, Mt. Forest and Hanover lodges, there was a large turnout of over eighty in the parade, which was led by Durham Band.

The new rector, Rev. M. H. Farr, in opening his discourse, welcomed the lodges and remarked it was his first opportunity to address the Odd-fellows, or any fraternal organization. He spoke from Eccl. 11:6: "In the morning sow thy seed and in the evening withhold not thine hand." Before the farmer sows his grain it is treated and cleaned; after he harvests it and covers it up; his work is finished and nature then produces the crop. It is the divine command to sow seed to bring others to Christ. We should sow in the morning of life, sow bible stories as soon as the child can understand. The sowing must be continued over a long period, using good seeds of love, honor, duty, chastity, etc., to bring good fruit. Parents are the first sowers, but day and S. S. teachers who follow have a great influence in moulding the lives of children. It is the duty of church people and the minister to continue sowing; also of societies like the I.O.O.F. and Rebekahs. Our place to sow good seed continues into the middle of life, when we can do much to influence others; if not sown, bad seeds creep in, grow more rapidly and crowd out the good. Our reward in sowing and developing the good seed is a happier and more secure future; salvation and eternal life.

Much valuable reading material was shipped to Western Canada and appreciative replies have been received from lonely women in the Western provinces. Supply reports were encouraging, and 10 Senior Life Memberships and 1 'In Memoriam' were presented, also Junior certificates. Welcome and Welfare work was stressed as very needy for strangers and those who are unable to attend meetings. A pleasing duet was rendered by members of the Drayton Y.W.A.

The Presbyterial was honored by a visit from Rev. Dr. Mal Campbell, Moderator of the General Assembly, who delivered a most inspiring address on "The Church", taking the words of St. Paul as his text: The Presbyterial joined with the Presbytery for this part of the service. The offering was dedicated by Mrs. Rev. Court of Holstein.

Mrs. Anderson, a missionary who has spent some years in Japan, gave a very interesting address on her work among the Koreans. Working conditions among the poorer classes were pictured, and especially the sad condition of the poorer women. In conclusion the speaker asked for the prayers of the people at home. The Mission Band of Durham presented a pleasing pageant entitled "Reapers."

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PREBYTERY OF SAUGEEN

The May meeting of Presbytery of Saugeen of the Presbyterian church, was held today in Durham church, at which a full sederunt represented the charges within the bounds. Besides the usual routine work and reports of standing committees, the Presbytery received the Moderator of the General Assembly, the Right Rev. Malcolm Campbell, D.D. The moderator brought a stirring message of encouragement and inspiration.

The Presbytery celebrated the recent honor brought within its bounds when the Rev. Samuel Lawrence of Rothsay was elected Moderator of the synod of Toronto and Kingston. All members joined in hearty congratulations. Among the business of today, the Presbytery took action against Sunday radio advertisement. Protest was lodged formally to the general manager of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

Tri-County League Would Expand Bounds

The annual meeting of the Tri-County Women's Softball League was held in the council chamber at Hanover, Thursday evening, with Messrs. Peter Ramage and R. L. Saunders of Durham, E. C. Croft and J. C. Dale of Harriston and J. R. Hamilton and E. C. Taylor of Hanover present.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, J. R. Hamilton Hanover; vice president, R. L. Saunders, Durham; sec'y-treas., E. B. Croft, Harriston.

The League will affiliate with the Provincial Women's Softball League and will use home and home umpires, with the visiting umpire having the choice of officiating at the plate or on the bases. Owing to complaints and squabbles over the scoring last year, the league decided that both scorers should sit together during a game and check up at the end of each inning. Where possible, a score board must be erected and used.

The following resolution was passed regarding protests: "Any club wishing to protest must deposit \$5 with the sec'y-treas., along with a written statement of their complaint, signed by the President and secretary of the protesting club. This must be sent by registered mail within 48 hours after the game in question. Also, the protesting club must send a notice of such protest to the club protested against at the same time, and the club protested against must likewise send a deposit of \$5 along with their version of the story by registered mail, signed by the president and secretary of the club, within 48 hours after receiving notice of the protest."

Any team wishing to enter the league must notify the secretary before 31st of May, as the schedule will be drawn up at Hanover on Tuesday, June 1st. The entrance fee of \$2 must accompany each application. Each team entering is entitled to one voting delegate.

To date only Harriston, Durham, Hanover, Chesley and, possibly, Mt. Forest have shown any indications of entering teams this year.

The league feels that there is room for many ladies teams throughout Grey and Bruce among the larger sporting towns with Durham, Hanover, Chesley and Walkerton forming a Central group; Warton, Hepworth, Tara, Southampton and Port Elgin a Northern group; Kincaid, Lucknow, Ripley, Teeswater and Wingham a Western group; Harriston, Mt. Forest, Palmerston and Listowel a Southern group; and Flesheron, Markdale, Dundalk and Shelburne an Eastern group.

The officers of the league are going to do some missionary work in many of these towns to try and build up the Tri County League.
