**MOTORISTS WARNED NEW SPEED LIMIT ON 24th**

"The amendment to the Motor Vehicles Act permitting speeds of 30 and 50 miles per hour in municipalities and rural sections respectively will go into effect on May 24," Hon. T. B. McQueen, Ontario minister of highways, announced Monday.

At the same time, he issued a strong warning to motorists that the new speed rates represented "the maximum permissible speed at which motor vehicles may be operated."

Mr. McQueen pointed out emphatically that the new speed limits were designed to meet the most ideal motoring conditions, and that motorists would have to slacken their pace in situations which called for care, courtesy, and the safety of pedestrians and other drivers, if the charge of reckless driving was to be avoided.

These speed law changes, however, were entirely dependent on 'ideal conditions,' he stressed. They could not take into consideration the many and varied situations which constantly arise on the highway and call for extra caution and slow speed, nor did they cover any defective equipment, such as lights, and brakes, on a driver's automobile.

"Ideal conditions" would not include whizzing past a country schoolhouse, where children might be on the highway, at 50 miles an hour, Mr. McQueen cited as one example to illustrate his point, "and no driver would be able to justify a speed of 30 miles per hour through a town on a busy market day."

Summing up the conditions under which the new speed amendment would be operated, the minister urged car drivers to bear in mind constantly that the revised rates were "maximums for ideal conditions," and that every motorist on streets or highways would be called upon more than ever to exercise care, courtesy and common-sense every minute he was behind the wheel of his automobile.

**OBITUARY**

**JOHN GARSON**

Long a pioneer of the 17th con., Egremont, Mr. John Garson died at the home of his daughter Mrs Archer in Toronto on Sunday in his 88th year. For the last six years, he and Mrs Garson, both in frail health, have been tenderly cared for in the city, deceased succumbing to hardening of the arteries and a general breakdown.

He was one of a large family, the son of the late Mr and Mrs John Garson, and the best part of his life was spent on the farm just west of Dromore. He was wedded to Miss A. Inkster, and to them were born two sons and two daughters: Alfred in the States; Tom and Annie, deceased and Belle, Mrs. Archer of Toronto. Sixteen years ago they retired from farm life to Holstein village and when Mrs. Garson's failing health came six years ago, they went to their daughter's home to reside.

One sister of the deceased in the West, besides his wife, daughter and son, survives him.

The late Mr. Garson was a kindly, friendly man, a good neighbor and one held in the greatest respect by many friends. He was a genius with machinery and while living retired in Holstein, devoted much of his time to repairing watches, clocks, jewelry and other articles which were brought to him from far and wide.

The remains were brought to Holstein Presbyterian church on Wednesday, the funeral service being conducted that afternoon by the pastor Rev. M. G. Court. Interment was made in the family plot in Amos church cemetery.

**JOHN LEGATE**

A native of North Egremont, Mr. John Legate, died in Durham hospital last Wednesday evening, after a two weeks' illness, in his 74th year. A few days before his death, he suffered an attack of hiccoughs, when he was removed to the hospital and succumbed to stomach trouble five days later.

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs R. Legate of Greenside, North Egremont, deceased grew to manhood there where he farmed until some thirty years ago. Fifty four years ago he married Helen Lumley and the family about 1907 removed to Dawn township, Lambton County, where they lived for five years, thence to Eddie Mills and Dresden in Kent Co. for two years each. Nineteen years ago they removed to Durham, which has since been their home.

Surviving are his widow and four of a family: Annie, Mrs Fred Osborne and John in Durham; Mary, Mrs Neil Livingstone in Petrolia and Wm. in London. One brother, Rev. Thos. Legate of Chicago, also survives—the last of a family of ten. There are six grandchildren.

Mr. Legate was an earnest Christian man, the soul of honor and integrity, of a friendly nature and an interesting raconteur. He was faithful in attendance at the services of Queen St. United church, of which he

was a member. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. R. G. Halbert from his late residence on Saddler St. at 1.30 p.m. Friday last, and interment was made in Amos cemetery, Dromore.

**Fined for Highway Accident**

Mr. George Smith of Durham, who ran into Provincial Police Constable W. A. Embleton, Warton, with his car, on the night of April 24th while the Provincial officer and Chief Shute of Warton, were investigating the accident on the county line five miles south of Warton, in which Mr. W. Legate of Owen Sound was seriously injured, pleaded not guilty to a charge of reckless driving in Magistrate Walker's Police Court at Warton last Friday morning. The accused was convicted and fined \$25 and costs amounting to \$51.75, besides having his driver's permit cancelled for three months.

Police Constable Embleton, Chief of police A. V. Shute and Mr. Walter Kennedy of Tara the driver of the truck involved in the accident, gave evidence that the accused drove past the scene of the accident at a high rate of speed, striking police officer Embleton and throwing him against the truck. The accused in his defence explained to the court that he was hurrying back home from Warton to attend to some important business and was driving about 45 miles an hour until within about a hundred yards of the truck, when he saw two or three men standing in the middle of the road. He slowed down to about forty miles per hour and the fear seized him that they might be hold up men. After striking the police officer he found that his fears were unfounded and he brought his car to a stop about fifty yards from the scene of the accident. He charged the police and truck driver with negligence for not setting out flares while engaged in the investigation. This the magistrate pointed out was not called for while the lighting equipment of the truck was in operation.—Sun-Times.
