HOPE TO KEEP

Grey County Council will convene for its June session at the county court house on Monday evening, June 21st, at 7.30 o'clock, Warden Angus MacArthur will preside. This is the busiest session of the County Council of the year, as it is at this meeting that the tax rate for the coming year is set. The present rate is 11 mills on the dollar, and County Treasurer J. C. Mercer is hopeful that this rate will not be increased at this session. He points out, however that under the equalized assessment of the past year the revenue will be reduced to the extent of about \$5000 and this will have to be absorbed if the tax rate is not to be increased.

One of the most important reports to be submitted at the June session is that of the Good Roads Committee which deals with the construction and maintenance of the county roads. In recent years the council has con-

ducted itself pretty well to maintain, and the roads have been well kept, but whether there will be any construction work undertaken this year or not remains to be seen.

South Grey Children will Attend Toronto Ex.

Hanover, Ontario, May 25, 1937.

To the Teachers of South Grey. Ladies and Gentlemen: For some weeks I have been trying to arrange for a Children's Excursion to Toronto Exhibition on the morning of Monday, August 30th next, and it gives me pleasure to say that the matter is sufficiently advanced to enable me to send out this circular.

This year the excursion will be for children from the 84 rural schools only, hence the pupils from the towns and incorporated villages of Hanover, Durham, Markdale, Flesher-ton, Dundalk and Neustadt, are not invited.

Children may go either by train or by car, and the assembling point will be at the front of the Union Station on Front Street, Toronto, at noon precisely, Standard time, on Monday, August 30th. From there the party will visit the rotunda of the Royal York Hotel, thence by the elevators to the observation tower of the Bank of Commerce, the highest building in the British Empire, from which the children will be able to see the City, Lake Ontario, and the shore of the United States across the Lake. From the bank the party will proceed to the Metropolitan Church, where the carillon will play a number of hymns for the children on the famous chimes. Also, in the church there will be a brief organ recital from the large pipe organ, and Rev. Dr. Dickson, pastor of the church will make a short address.

From the church the party will proceed by bus to the Zoological Gardens where lions, tigers, bears, snakes, monkeys and dozens of other forms of wild life will be on exhibition. The next point of interest will be a trip through Rosedale to Chorley Park, the residence of His Honor, The Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, and from there the party will be taken to the Parliament Buildings, which will be open for inspection, and in the Legislative Chamber the children will be addressed briefly by the Hon. Mitchell Hepburn, Premier of Ontario, by the Hon. Dr. Simpson, who is Minister of Education, and by Mr. V. K. Greer, M.A., Chief Inspector of Ontario Schools. It is hoped that the children will be introduced to those gentlemen by Mr. Farquhar Oliver, M.P.P. for South Grey.

At this point, through the kindness of the Kiwanis Club and the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire, lunch will be served, after which through the kindness of the same organizations, the children will be driven direct to the Exhibition grounds, arriving there about seven o'clock.

Through the kindness of the Executive of the Exhibition we have been able to secure 500 specially reserved seats in the Grand Stand, from which the evening display of fireworks may be seen. After this is over the pupils will walk to Queen Victoria Public School, which is close by, where the party will sleep, the girls occupying the South room, and the boys the north room, of the Kindergarten Department.

On Tuesday morning, 31st, the party will again proceed to the Exhibition grounds, and at the Dufferin Street Entrance they will be met by a large party of Boy Scouts and Girl Guides of Toronto, each of whom will take charge of about ten of the children, taking them through all the buildings and giving them ample opportunity to see all the exhibits.

Promptly at one o'clock the entire party will reassemble at the Flag Pole on the Lake front, eat lunch and rest until three o'clock, when the party will leave for home. Teachers are requested to note carefully the following:

1. As I can secure free tickets to the Grand Stand and to the Exhibition for only 500 children, and as sleeping accommodation for only that many is available, the party will consist of just that number, 500 hence children under 11 years of age are not invited this year.
2. Each child's hat must be decorated or quilt, for sleeping purposes, and enough lunch for four meals. The lunch for the four meals should be in the four separate parcels, one for each pupil.
3. Each child's hat must be decorated with two strips of white tape in the form of a cross sewed to four equally distant points to the rim, and to the top of the crown. Tape for this purpose will be sent to the teachers as soon as I hear from you as to the number likely to go.
4. As there are many hundreds

of children in South Grey who have never been on a railway train, the excursion will be by that means. The following rates will apply for children under 12. All rates quoted are return: Markdale \$1.40; Flesher-ton \$1.30; Saugeen Jct. \$1.25; Dundalk \$1.15. Children over 12 must pay twice that fare. On the C.N.R. from Elmwood the rate is \$1.75; Hanover \$1.65; Neustadt \$1.60; Ayton \$1.60. Children may go by car, but those who join the party must be at the Union Station, Front St., Toronto, sharp at noon Standard time. Children will eat noon lunch on the train before arriving at the city, and all parcels of bedding and lunch will be taken from the trains, both lines, at Parkdale, and taken to the Queen Victoria School, where, through the kindness of Mr. Fuller, the Business Administrator of the Board of Education, Toronto, and of the Board itself, the children will be permitted to sleep. All parcels must be wrapped, tied and have children's names and addresses on them.

5. Except for transportation the children will not require any money, as the entire program outlined above is free. It will be well, however, for each child to have a small sum of money, say 25c. for emergencies.

6. On no account will children be permitted to go shopping in Toronto or to visit friends, but friends in the city may visit the children early on Tuesday morning, from 7.30 to 8.30, Daylight Saving Time, at the Queen Victoria School, Close Avenue.

7. Children will not be left alone for a moment, night or day, from the time they come to their station to take the train for Toronto. The following teachers will assist me as chaperons and will be on the trains from the start. Mr. Wm. Vanderburgh, Miss Irene Curtis, Miss Kelly Watt, Miss Irene Martin, Mr. Jackson Stewart. The chaperons will be with their respective sexes over night at the Queen Victoria School.

8. Teachers are requested to send me, before June 15th, (early greatly appreciated), names of children likely to go. For the present at least, it might be wise not to encourage more than six from each school to go. A circular will be sent each teacher in due time giving information about the great exhibition.
