Death of Mrs. Richard Parker. Some of our readers may have heard of the death of Mrs. Richard Parker of Uno Park in Northern Ontario some weeks ago, but to the Review it was news. The deceased lady with her husband, were pillars in the life of Durham Methodist church many years ago and their church interests did not end when they moved to Uno Park. She was in her 81st year.

Loss of Infant Son by Death. Though an infant of about six months, the death of the son of Ewen and Mrs. Ritchie, comes as a severe heartbreak to them, also the paternal grandfather, Bert Ritchie, with whom they made their home.

The cause of death was baffling to medical men summoned, both in Durham and Owen Sound, which does not ease the hand of death. Sympathy is very warm for the bereaved parents.

Cars Collide on Main Corner. Coming from the south along main street and turning west at main corner onto Lambton street, Archie Wilson in his new Chev. sedan collided with another car travelling south on main street, driven by Wm. Brown of Hamilton. The accident occurred shortly before 8 p.m. Sunday evening but none of occupants were hurt. Wilson's car had fender crumpled, radiator and one lamp driven in, while the other car is said to be even more damaged.

Work Started on No. 4 Highway. Work has now started in earnest on No. 4 highway, proceeding east from Hanover. The hills and hollows are being cut and filled and the sharp curves west from Allan Park will be enlarged considerably to make accidents less frequent. The fence posts are being moved back ten feet on each side. It is rumored that the new highway will have a three-foot strip down the centre for telephone and hydro poles, banked by a twenty five foot stretch of pavement on either side.

Now a Graduate Nurse. Mr and Mrs. Fred Kelsey and Mrs D. C. Town of Orillia, attended the annual graduation exercises of the training school of Sarnia General Hospital in that city on Tuesday, June 8th, when their daughter and sister, Miss Norma Kelsey was one of the graduating class of twelve.

Over 1000 people attended and the principal speaker was Dr. Fred Routley of Toronto, sec'y of the Ontario Hospital Association. As well as receiving her diploma and graduation pin, Norma also captured the two prizes made available to members of the graduating class—the general proficiency award, donated by the Sarnia Hospital Commission, and one for materia medica, donated by P. T. McGibbon. Mr. McGibbon presented her with the prizes which consisted of a gold wrist watch and a set of nurses instruments. Rev. F. G. Hardy, rector of St. George's church, Sarnia, formerly of Durham, administered the Florence Nightingale pledge to the graduating class. We congratulate Norma on the honors she has so creditably attained.

## Blood Poisoning ends Fatally for Robt. McCaslin

One of the saddest deaths of the year was that of Robert McCaslin, a well-known North Bentinck resident, last Saturday when but in his sixtieth year. He had cut his finger about two weeks previous and from this not being properly disinfected, infection started. After taking ill, he was conveyed to Hanover hospital shortly over a week before his death there. Blood poisoning it was revealed, had set in, and medical skill was not able to conquer it.

The late Mr. McCaslin was wedded about thirty years ago to Miss Alice Boyce, and lived for some years in the West. Returning to Bentinck, he purchased his present homestead, the And. Milne farm east of Louise where they have since resided. Besides the bereaved wife, there survive one son Kiline in Derby township and five daughters: Mrs R. McLean (Verne) and Mrs. Tuck (Jessie) of Toronto; Florence of Hanover; Mrs. H. Kaufman (Grace) of Detroit and Vera at home. Also surviving are his oldest brother Henry at Mulock and other brothers and sisters in the West.

The deceased was of a genial disposition, highly respected in his home and district, and far beyond. He was an Orangeman, and for a few years some years ago, was a Councillor of Bentinck Township.

The funeral service on Tuesday was very largely attended, and conducted by his pastor, Rev. R. Heeney at the home and by Rev. R. G. Halbert of Durham at Durham cemetery, where interment was made. Burial took place under Orange auspices.
