Owners of both Cattle and Sheep En- play. titled to Compensation when Animals are Killed or Injured by Dogs.

All owners of cattle or sheep killed or injured by dogs are entitled compensation either by the dog owners or by the municipality, according to legislation sponsored and piloted through the Ontario Legislature at the last session by the Hon. Duncan Marshall, Ontario Minister of Agriculture. "Injured" or "injuring" applies to injuries caused by wounding, team this year. worrying, terrifying or pursuing.

Up until the last session of the Legislature, the Act applied only to Mrs Irwin (Cassie) and uncles Bert sheep. So many reports of cattle being killed or maimed by savage dogs were received by Hon. Mr. Marshall. that he decided legislation should be introduced to provide compensation for these cattle owners, the result being "The Dog Tax and Live Stock Ethel, all in Hamilton, and Vera, R.N.
