Traffic Violators Next To Insane

Declared Underdeveloped Nervous System and Unnatural Egotism Are Their Characteristics

DETROIT. — If you are a persistent traffic law violator, maybe you're parapsychotic. Dr. Lowell S. Selling, head of the Detroit Recorders' Court clinic, has announced discovery of a new mental disorder known as parapsychosis.

Dr. Selling described the disorder at the International Congress of Psychology, which he attended recently in Paris.

"Parapsychosis is a mental disorder due to an underdeveloped nervous system and lack of insight," Dr. Selling said. "It is a border-line case of insanity."

For example, the parapsychotic has strange explanations for his traffic violations and is notably lacking in insight, which causes the patient to develop an unnatural egotism, the doctor said.

Dr. Selling believed that victims could be cured, but noted that at the present time his Detroit clinic was unable to take care of the disease. He said he had found six cases of the disorder among 300 people examined in traffic clinic during the last year. All six were males, he said.

He cited the case of a parapsychotic, who felt he was privileged to park in a certain prohibited zone, although he would not park in any other restricted zone. Another victim, the doctor said, disliked his stepfather, who was a police officer. From the dislike he developed a mild hatred toward all law officers.

Along with the action to recover cost of the trip, Elie has tied up his former sweetie's bank account here with a seizure until the merits of the case are decided.

In the main action, Elie says he courted Miss Zdrobrou for three or four years and finally she agreed to marry him but stipulated the ceremony take place in Roumania.

Elie says he conceded the point and paid costs of the trip, only to be met some time after arrival with a refusal by his fiancée to go through with the marriage. Still in his bachelor state, he was forced to return to Montreal while Miss Zdrobrou remained in Roumania.

Canadian Tourist Trade Increases

Foundation Complete For Largest Telescope

MT. PELOMAR, Calif. — A squat mass of steel 135 feet wide huddles atop Mt. Palomar waiting to receive a 200-inch glass eye that will reveal to man more than eight times as much of the universe as he has ever seen before.

It is the turntable foundation for what is to be the world's greatest telescope. For 14 months scientists at the California Institute of Technology at Pasadena have been grinding the great reflecting mirror — 200 inches, or almost 17 feet, wide — that will rest in the bottom of a 60-foot tube to be mounted on the steel base.

The tube is nearing completion in Philadelphia and soon will be shipped here.

California technicians are now boring 38 holes in the bottom of the mirror. Base supports will fit into the holes.

When that task is finished, they will start the tedious process of making the flat surface concave so that it will centre its view of the heavens into the telescope's eyepiece. Seven smaller mirrors will aid this process.

The large mirror is expected to be finished and installed in 1939. It will weigh 20 tons.

Cattle Exports To U.S.
Total 109,919 Head

WASHINGTON. — The Commissioner of United States Customs announced this week cattle imports from Canada and Mexico from Jan. 1 to July 31 totalled 134,097 head, or 86.1 per cent of the total allowance quota provision of the Canadian trade agreement. Cattle weighing 700 lb. or more imported from Canada totalled 109,919 head. Imports from Mexico, which comes under the Canadian agreement, were 24,178 head.

Canada's Export Trade Soars

Increase of \$112,302,000 Reported for First Seven Months of 1937

OTTAWA. — Canada's export trade jumped to \$617,009,774 in the first seven months of 1937, increase of \$112,302,000 over the corresponding period last year, it was reported this week by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

Canadian shipments to the United States increased from \$196,353,470 to \$271,124,289 and to the United Kingdom, from \$195,965,956 to \$212,431,632.

In July, exports totalled \$95,157,775, compared with \$83,698,858 last year. Compared with a year ago, wheat exports at \$12,291,000 were \$5,594,000 lower but many other commodities showed increases — flour, cattle, cheese, meats, fish, newsprint, lumber, automobiles farm implements, copper, lead and nickel.

Wheat Prices Will Go Higher

Drought in Australia and Argentina Threatens Wheat Production

CHICAGO. — Big drought areas in Australia and Argentina threatening to curtail crop production are now looming as a major influence for higher prices on wheat.

Estimates current here indicate that 75 percent of the 15,500 acres seeded to wheat in Australia, is facing critical necessity of rain, and that the chief producing districts of northern Argentina continue to suffer from a lack of moisture. It is already too late for additional planting of wheat in Argentina.

The outlook for Argentina and Australia is regarded by the Chicago wheat trade as suggesting a below normal yield for the southern hemisphere and that the crop situation there is likely to become more important every week from now on.

With fairly accurate figures at present available as to the 1937 harvest in the northern hemisphere, and with much closer attention being given to conditions south of the Equator, the wheat prices as compared to one week back were ranging from 1 1/2 of a cent off to 7/8 up. Simultaneously, corn was 3/8 to 2 3/4 down, oats 1/4 to 1/8 lower, rye varying from 1 cent to 1 1/8 advance, and provisions showing 22 cents to 55 cents setback.

Horse Paralysis Epidemic In West

WINNIPEG. — Representatives of the Manitoba Veterinary Association and Federal and Provincial agriculturalists this week turned to United States laboratories for a further supply of cephalomylexins serum in their efforts to check an epidemic of the disease that has already claimed scores of horses in Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

Only stock of the serum in Manitoba was 100 tubes — sufficient for 10 initial doses. This was insufficient to care for the reported hundreds of stricken animals.

Symptoms of the strange horse disease which took a 20 per cent death toll of horses affected in 1935 in Central Canada, are drowsiness in the animal followed by a condition in which it loses control of muscular action. Only infrequently have cases been reported in urban centres, leading to the belief that the disease is contracted from virus in the soil.

Acuteness of the situation has been increased by the lack of sufficient serum and the threat of delayed harvesting. In Morris, Man., 40 miles south of Winnipeg, Dr. Fred Skinner reported 50 horses stricken and ordinary medicines useless.

Cecile Dionne Ends "Talk Strike"

CALLANDER. — It required a mother's cajolery to end the first strike of Dionne, the mother of the quintuplets, heard the "middleweight," Cecile, crying plaintively in the isolation ward.

On one of her frequent visits to Dafoe Hospital, Mrs. Dionne left the four sisters in the playroom to visit Cecile. A nurse told her Cecile had been on a "talk strike" for several days and pettishly refused to answer when spoken to. The doctor was worried about her, said the nurse.

Mrs. Dionne talked to the youngest for some time before a reply was forthcoming. "Will I bring Pauline's little pet dog over?" she asked in French.

"Oul, oul," Cecile murmured. She scampered from her cot to her mother's chair, kissed her soundly and trotted meekly back to bed.

Mrs. Dionne pursued her questions and finally got the child answering readily. On visits from Mr. and Mrs. Dionne and the older brothers and sisters of the quintuplets last week, Cecile had not been allowed to see them due to her cold.

So much enthusiasm had the four well wishes for Papa Dionne's felt that it has become completely devoid of living in the last week. The little girls find it jolly sport to rip and tug at the new buttoned bodice.
