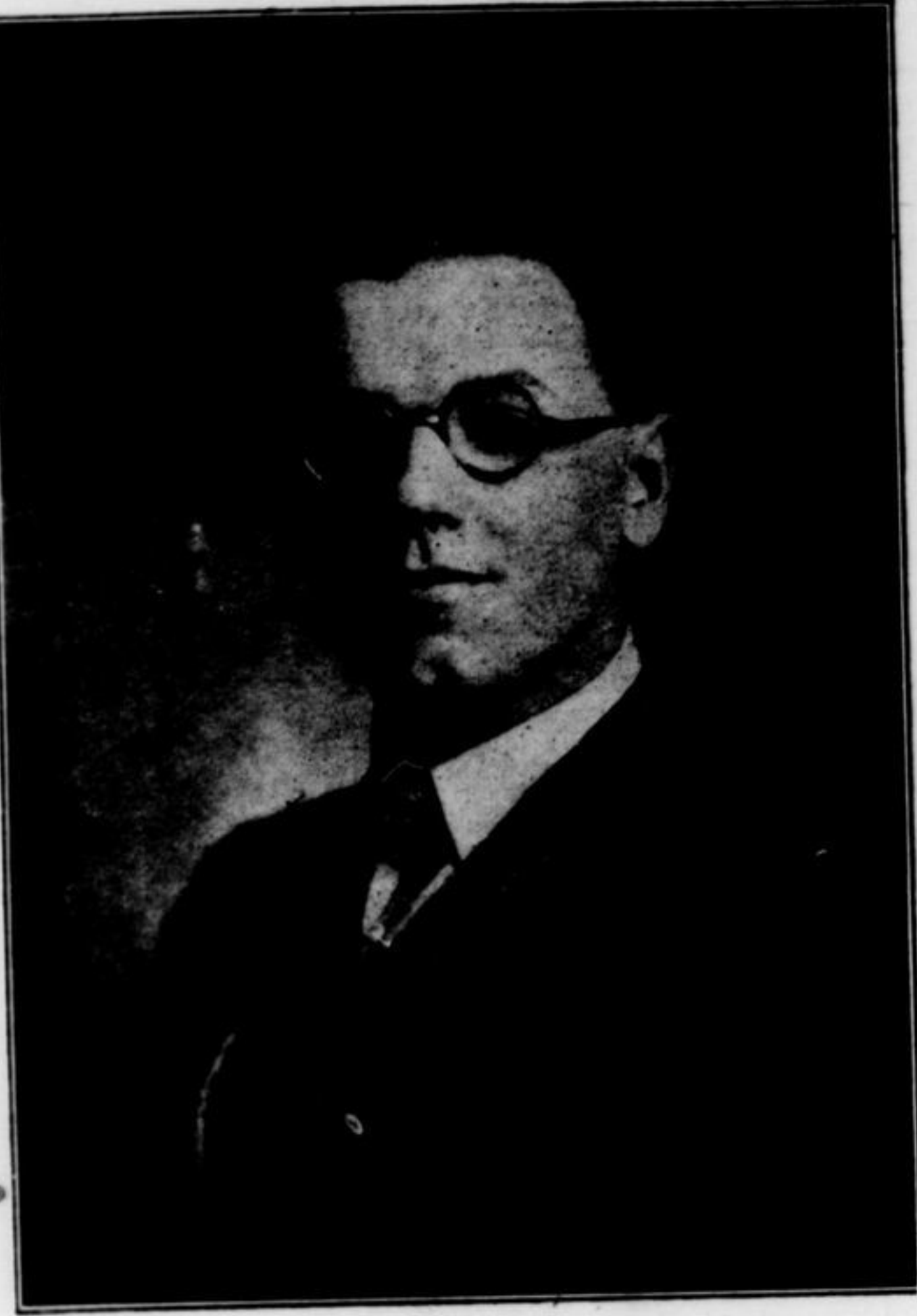

F. R. Oliver, Victor in South Grey with Reduced Majority

1272 Approximate Lead. — North Grey returns Liberal by over by over 2300. Hanover Vote large Factor in Oliver's Win.

South Grey for the fourth consecutive time Wednesday, gave F. R. Oliver M. P. P. a decisive mandate to its representative at Queen's Park, his majority being 1272, with one poll in Normanby unreported. This is his second largest majority in the four campaigns, but the top one, 2689 three years ago, was abnormal, owing to the widespread desire at that time tooust the Henry government.

Mr. Oliver fought a clean campaign practically unaided but for Miss Macphail's help; his only outside speaker being Hon. Harry Nixon in Hanover. His opponent Dr. D. B. Jamieson put up a strong argument, had a good organization, had many speakers, both outside and local, but was unable to defeat the confidence the riding holds in its present member.

Dr. Jamieson polled a heavy vote in Durham and surrounding polls, and can be proud of the confidence of his home electorate. Elsewhere he cut into majorities, but in the extreme East and West of the riding, Oliver gained or held his ground.

Hanover, with 511 lead for Oliver, gave him magnificent support, while Egrement was, as usual, his banner township.

The vote by polls as far as available follows: the official count will be made Tuesday next, which may reveal slight changes.

As early as 8 p.m., when Hanover's vote was known, Oliver's election was conceded, and the crowds thronging Durham streets for an hour or two, dissolved and quietness reigned locally, when the majority mounted over 1000. About 10.30 the successful member arrived at Durham Town Hall, and in a short address, Mr. Oliver thanked his assembled sup-

New Sidewalks Completed

October town Council session held on Monday evening was not a heavy one, and no outstanding business was transacted.

The Clerk-Treas. was instructed to prepare and send out the accounts of ratepayers fronting on the new sidewalks, with a request that same be paid by Dec. 1st.

The Clerk was authorized to advertise in the local paper, calling the attention of the citizens to Fire Prevention Week, and requesting that the householders have their chimneys cleaned so as to obviate the necessity of the fire men making unnecessary runs this fall and winter.

Men on Fire Brigade who are liable for poll tax were exempted while active members of the Brigade.

Accounts totalling \$1475 and Relief accounts of \$82.04 were ordered paid. Coun. McQueen, chairman of Board of Works, reported that new sidewalks were now all completed, and quite a number of the former blocks taken up, had been laid on Lambton St. The streets are now in very good condition while the work of repairing walks elsewhere was now satisfactory completed. The total cost of all new sidewalks amounted to \$1373.92.

Coun. McGowan reported that he considered the Waterworks Dept., Public Utilities Com., should be required to properly fill under sidewalks where tunnelling was done.

Liberals Again Sweep Ontario at the Polls Wednesday

Cns. Leader Earl Rowe Defeated.— Premier Hepburn wins his Elgin Riding by 5000 majority.

Ontario said "Carry on, Mitch", in no uncertain tone Wednesday, when the electors endorsed the Hepburn administration by returning them to power with a lead little short of the 1934 record majority.

Last Provincial returns before midnight gave Liberals 63 seats, Conservatives 21, Liberal-Progressives 2; Ind. Labor 1, and U.F.O. 1. This gives Premier Mitchell P. Hepburn a bout 40 majority in a House of 90, which should be more than ample.

Two of the cabinet ministers—Hon. Duncan Marshall in Peel and Hon. Dr. Faulkner in West Hastings, went down to defeat, but all others are returned. Hon. Earl Rowe, Conservative leader, lost out in East Simcoe against Hon. Dr. Simpson, and Col. Drew, who opposed Rowe for leadership, was defeated in South Wellington. In North Wellington McEwing, liberal, won out over Dr. McQuibban.

The result is a clear endorsement of the Premier's firm stand against C.I.O. domination in Ontario, especially since Oshawa, the strike center, elected a Liberal member, and also reveals that the electors appreciate Mr. Hepburn's work in lowering taxes and placing the province on a sound financial basis.
