LESSON III CHRISTIAN SPEECH AND CONDUCT-James, Chapter 3 Golden Text .- Let no corrupt speech proceed out of your mouth. Ephe-

THE LESSON IN ITS SETTING. Time. - The date of the epistle of James is greatly disputed. The auther died in 63 A.D. Some place the epistle the year before this, while others date it as early as 50 A.D.

The exact date cannot be determ-

Place.-Probably James wrote the epistle in the city of Jerusalem.

The author of this epistle was the Stother of the Lord Jesus, and is referred to directly only twice in the Gospels (Matt. 12:46; 13:55; Mark 6:3. Cf. John 2:12; 7:3,5). He was, of course, a Jew, brought up in the strict teachings of the Jewish synagogue, devoted to the law of Moses, zealous in living a righeous and godly life. His was probably the first epistle written in the early themselves for superior places of

It is against this general desire to be prominent as instructors that St. James is here warning his readers. In teaching others, they were in danger of forgetting to teach them- a manifest lie. a contradiction of selves; to possess faith and to do | what they must know to be the truth. nothing but talk.

If any stumbleth not in word, the same is a perfect man, able to bridle the whole body also. 3. Now if we put the horses' bridles into their mouths, that they may obey us, we turn about their whole body also. James here begins the subject which occupies almost the entire chapter. namely, that of the control of the Aongue. What James here means is that, if a man has his tongue under control, i.e., his speech, he will be thereby keeping under control all the organs of his body which will lead him into sin if not mastered. Augustine well remarks: "James does not say that no one can tame the tongue, but no one of men; so I that, when it is tamed, we confess that this is brought about by the pity,

the help, the grace of God." The aposle now calls the attention of his readers to the great but mysterious truth with which we are all acquainted-that with the tongue great good and great evil both may be effected.

9. Therewith bless we the Lord and Father; and therewith curse we men, who are made after the likeness of God, 10. Out of the same mouth cometh forth blessing and cursing.

'How great are the possibilities of a tongue which is under divine control, cleansed and anointed! What sorrows it can comfort, what wounds it can heal, what strife it can still! It is also God's mightiest instrument for the pulling down of the strongholds of sin, and the upbuilding of his kingdom.

My brethren, these things ought not so to be. It was abnormal that a man should bless God in his prayers or creed and yet so despise or speak evil of members of his own family, inasmuch as he and his fellow-men were the offspring of a com-

James proceeds from his specific discussion of speech to the larger question of wisdom. The understanding of things human and divine and their causes. It is the word used to describe the wisdom of Christ himself (Matt. 13:54). James refers to the need for wisdom at the very beginning of his epistle (1:5, 6), and now returns to the subject once again. Let him show by his good life his

works in meekness of wisdom. Meek-

ness in the New Testament "included submissiveness to God as well as gentleness towards man. 14. But if ye have bitter jealousy and faction in your heart, glory not and lie not against the truth. The word here translated faction might be more accurately translated "rivalry," expressing the strife existing among different individuals or groups of individuals. There is nothing more tragic in the world than to see Christion teachers, and officers in the Christian church striving among honor, and angry if someone else

gets more praise than they get. To glory with their tongues of superior isdom, while they cherished jealousy and faction in their hearts, was

James now turns from his discussion of wisdom in general to a characterization and development of the two kinds of wisdom which men may have, one bearing evil fruit, and the other bearing fruits of righteousness.

15. This wisdom. That is, any such wisdom that allows jealousy and faction in one's heart. Is not a wisdom that cometh down from above, but is earthly. That is, it does not have a divine origin, but derives from the natural plane on which unregenerated men live. "It belongs to the lower impulses, not the higher, in man's nature. Devilish. The original word here really refers not so much to the devil himself, as to demons, and as partaking of the nature of demons or unclean spirits who are represented as possessing the souls of men, and reducing them to the level of madness.

16. For where jealousy and faction deed. In I Cor. 14:33, God is said to be the author, not of confusion, but of peace. The word here translated vile means good for nothing.

17. But the wisdom that is from above is first pure. (See Prov. 2: 3-6). "The purity of the heavenly wisdom does not consist merely in victory over temptations of the flesh, but in freedom from worldly and low motives. "I cannot win men from impurity to purity if I am not pure." cause the man who is inspired with pure wisdom has no ulterior, selfish

Dicing With Death On The Highways

Little Children and Old People Are Being Killed In Ontario Traffic Accident

The dice-cup is for daredevils who willingly bet their cash on the caprice of the ivory cubes, but in that giddy game of life and death which is Ontario's traffic lottery, everyone has a stake, willing or not. Doddering old men, tiny tots-yes, even babes in

Last year, 26 toddlers up to four years of age met death in automobile accidents almost as soon as they had learned to talk; 23 of these were wee pedestrians who perished even as they were learning to walk. Two out of every three persons 65

years and over who departed from this life in traffic accidents last year were on foot when their fatal moment

There is a severe indictment of reckless driving to be found in these figures-a charge of apathy, if not of

gross negligence. Little children cannot be held accountable for their actions; they cannot be expected to take care of themselves in traffic. Drivers must think for them and protect them. Elderly persons are at an equal disadvantage. The mind may be clear but the footsteps falter and the necessary nimbleness has left their limbs. Drivers must look out for them, too, if needless highway fatalities are to be pre-

Albanian Town Is Mohammedan

Majority in Gjinokaster Cling to View of Turks, Rest Greek Christians

Gjinokaster, a town of approximately 11,000 inhabitants situated near the southern extremity of Albania, is predominantly Mohammedan, says a bulletin from the National Geographical Society. The rest of the population is Greek-speaking Orthodox Christians. Only ten miles from the Greek frontier, Gjinokaster was claimed by Greece at the end of the Balkan Wars in 1912-13, but without success. Mohammedanism, of course, is a hold-over from the long period, 1479 to 1912, when this rugged, mountainous kingdom of the Balkan Peninsula was a part of Turkey.

Mountain Kingdom Situated 1,060 feet above sea level among rugged mountains, Gjinokaster's white-roofed houses are ranged along a hilltop and straggle like lines of snow down into the V-shaped valley. Up and down winding mountain roads plod the donkeys of sturdy Tosks plying to small, open-faced shops selling cigarettes, cheese, carpets, woolen materials and other praduce. The manufacture of cheese, one of Albania's main exports, is an important industry in Gjinokaster. Another favored occupation there is carpet weaving, a reminder of the long years Albania was under Turkish dom-

Water Is Wealth Near the town are great groves of

olives and to the north, American corn, small grains, and other crops are raised in the fertile fields that lie like checkerboards along the valley of the Viosa River between bluish peaks, snowclad throughout much of the winter.

Water is wealth in Albania. She has but two navigable rivers and these are only partially and seasonably so. Wasted torrents from the mountains in winter and bone-dry stream beds in summer-these are the extremes in the water problem of the country where the creation of storage lakes could be an economic boon,

World's Longevity Record Claimed for Four Captives in Philadelphia Zoo

Four members of the Philadelphia Zoo family claim the world's longevity record for captive members of their species.

Haunching in a corner of his cage, paying no attention to visitors and disdaining the rope swings which were his delight when he was the young anthropoid on the flying trapeze, is "Bobby" a 31-year-old gib-

The turtles, champions of the zoo's old timers' club came from the Lower Mississippi in 1890 and have been on exhibit five years longer than any other known individuals of their kind, Dr. Herbert L. Ratcliffe, assistant pathologist at the zoo, said,

On the basis of years of residence in captivity "Bobby" beats the previous record of gibbons by seven years and seven months, and "Bessie" bests that of other vultures by two years.
