Women Jurists To Have Lounge

Will Cost \$2,500; 'Powder Room' Has Been Asked

Women who serve on New York County Supreme Court Juries are going to have a \$2,500 lounging room with every facility for their convenience. It was announced by John Ahern, jury clerk for the court. Mr. Ahern said that plans for the room already had been prepared and that official approval was expected soon.

Two large circular mirrors were placed in a room assigned to women jurors on the fourth floor of the county court house. Several complained. The lack of adequate conveniences for women jurors has been marked since the first mixed panel was drawn, and since they began jury service several women have asked for a "powder room."

The proposal for a lounging room for them was sent to Samuel Levy, Manhattan Borough president, on May 27. Mr. Ahern revealed, and when it comes back with Mr. Levy's approval, it will be sent to the budget director for a final decision on an appropriation to cover the cost of the new installation. This it was said, was confidently expected.

Baking Powder Biscuits: 2 cups sifted flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons butter or other shortening, 2-3 cup milk (about), Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening; add milk gradually until soft dough is formed. Roll 1/4 inch thick on slightly floured board. Cut with floured biscuit cutter. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 12 biscuits. Eggs and vegetables which are so necessary in growing children's diet can be combined in an appetizing vegetable omelet. Potato Crust For Meat Pie: 6 medium-sized potatoes, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, Hot rich milk. Peel potatoes and boil until tender. Drain, then shake over low heat until dry. Rice or mash thoroughly. Add butter, salt and pepper. Whip very light with sufficient hot milk to moisten suitably. Pile roughly over top of hot meat mixture in deep greased baking dish, and brush with melted butter. Re-heat and brown in a hot oven, 450 degrees F. Note 1. Sweet potatoes may be used instead of white potatoes. Note 2. For pies using potato crust, fill baking dish with meat mixture only to within an inch of the rim, before adding the potato crust. Vegetable Mixture: 1/2 cup fresh peas, 1/2 cup celery, cut in strips, 2-3 cup raw carrots, diced, 1 medium onion, sliced, 2 tablespoons butter, Salt, Pepper. Cook vegetables together in small amount of water until just tender. Drain. Sauté in butter and season with salt and pepper. Prepare omelet; turn out on platter. Place vegetables between folded layers. Serve at once. Serves 6. Omelet: 2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 3/4 cup milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 4 egg yolks, beaten until thick and lemon colored, 4 egg whites, beaten stiff. Combine dry ingredients and milk in top of double boiler. Place over rapidly boiling water, bring to scalding point (allow 3 to 5 minutes), and cook 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Add butter. Cool slightly. Add egg yolks. Fold in egg whites. Pour into hot, buttered 10-inch frying pan. Cook over low flame 2 minutes. Then bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 15 minutes. Move to Preserve Treasures of Art

Loss of Great Masterpieces Will Be Stopped

The National Gallery fronting on Trafalgar Square, London, England, is reputed to hold the second or third finest art collection in the world. And within a few moments' ride are the Tate Gallery and the National Portrait Gallery. No one pretends to place a value on the paintings and sculpture which are housed in these galleries. They have been built up by purchase and by donation and works of art, once acquired are never sold.

Criticized In the past six months the directors of the galleries as well as the Government have been criticized severely for failure to preserve and maintain the art treasures in England. The Government has not challenged the critics and newspapers like the Times not only concede the truth of the charges but express the deepest concern for the future.

In State of Decay It seems that the Government, the directors of the galleries and private individuals have been so intent upon adding to the national collections of art that little thought has been given to preserving the paintings already possessed. Thus many of the world's masterpieces are in peril of being lost. In the Tate gallery, for example, three Turner's valued at \$75,000 each, are in an advanced state of decay. These paintings are, "Port Ruysdael," "Pilate Washing His Hands," and "Bay of Baia."

Says Family Court Would Strike at Roots of Crime

Failures of Parole Under Court Supervision Only 1 1/2 Per Cent Royal Commission on Parole Told

Establishment throughout Canada of family courts with probation supervision such as is maintained in Ontario would strike deeply at the roots of crime. Judge J. F. McKinley of the family court told the royal commission on penitentiaries at Ottawa. Failures of those on parole were only 1 1/2 per cent. In the Ottawa family court area, Judge McKinley said, while the figure for Canada was 18 per cent.

Friendly Advice

Policy of the Ottawa court was to furnish friendly advice, lend a ready ear to troubles threatening domestic happiness, and to settle family differences before necessity arose for court action. Paroled prisoners called frequently for advice and encouragement. He would be glad, Judge McKinley said, to take over all tickets of sale men in the district at no cost to the federal government if the justice department would agree.

Farm For Boys

Side lines of the Ottawa family court, Judge McKinley, said, included an \$8 acre farm for the summer care of underprivileged boys, maintained by one of his personal friends. It had entertained more than 6,000 boys and assisted them in finding pleasant and healthful use of their summer holidays.

Another venture of the family court was to take over the budgets of families threatened by financial trouble. It had handled as high as 70,000 a year and individual salaries up to \$2,000 a year. It was his belief that fully 50 per cent of family discord arose from money trouble.

A Chain of Courts

In a chain of family courts from Halifax to Vancouver would do more than anything else to reduce crime," said Judge McKinley, "and the root of all crime is in the home. At least 75 per cent of crime comes from broken homes."

He had personally talked to 20,000 prisoners in his 15 years of family court work and had formed the belief that friendly treatment coupled with strict discipline was the best influence in reforming criminals.

In addition to being chief probation officer for Ottawa, Judge McKinley is chairman of the Ontario parole board. In his 15 years' association with that body he had never known of a single instance of political interference, he said.

Night Rambles Through Tenement Squallor Interested Former King in Housing Problems

Solitary night rambles through tenement squallor awakened the Duke of Windsor's interest in housing problems. His former chauffeur, Stanley Ladbroke, the man who drove the Duke's cars for 15 years, told those incoherent exclamations which he thinks aroused the Duke's desire to study housing and working conditions.

For 6 1/2 years, Elwin Pope, 65, has been housekeeper for his school teacher wife, washing pots and pans, setting up her lunch and driving her to school.

Last week he won \$25 a month temporary alimony, pending trial of her divorce suit.

Pope had agreed to do the housework and she had bread-wonned before their marriage at Phoenix, Ariz., February 10, 1931, because he was in poor health and could not work. In her suit, Mrs. Pope charged that when she turned down the fire under a pot on the stove stove out, he set it on fire and fled. She had to get on a couch and declared she was not going to run the house or kitchen. In a cross-complaint asking reasonable permanent alimony, Pope said his wife refused to speak to him, leaving notes instead.
