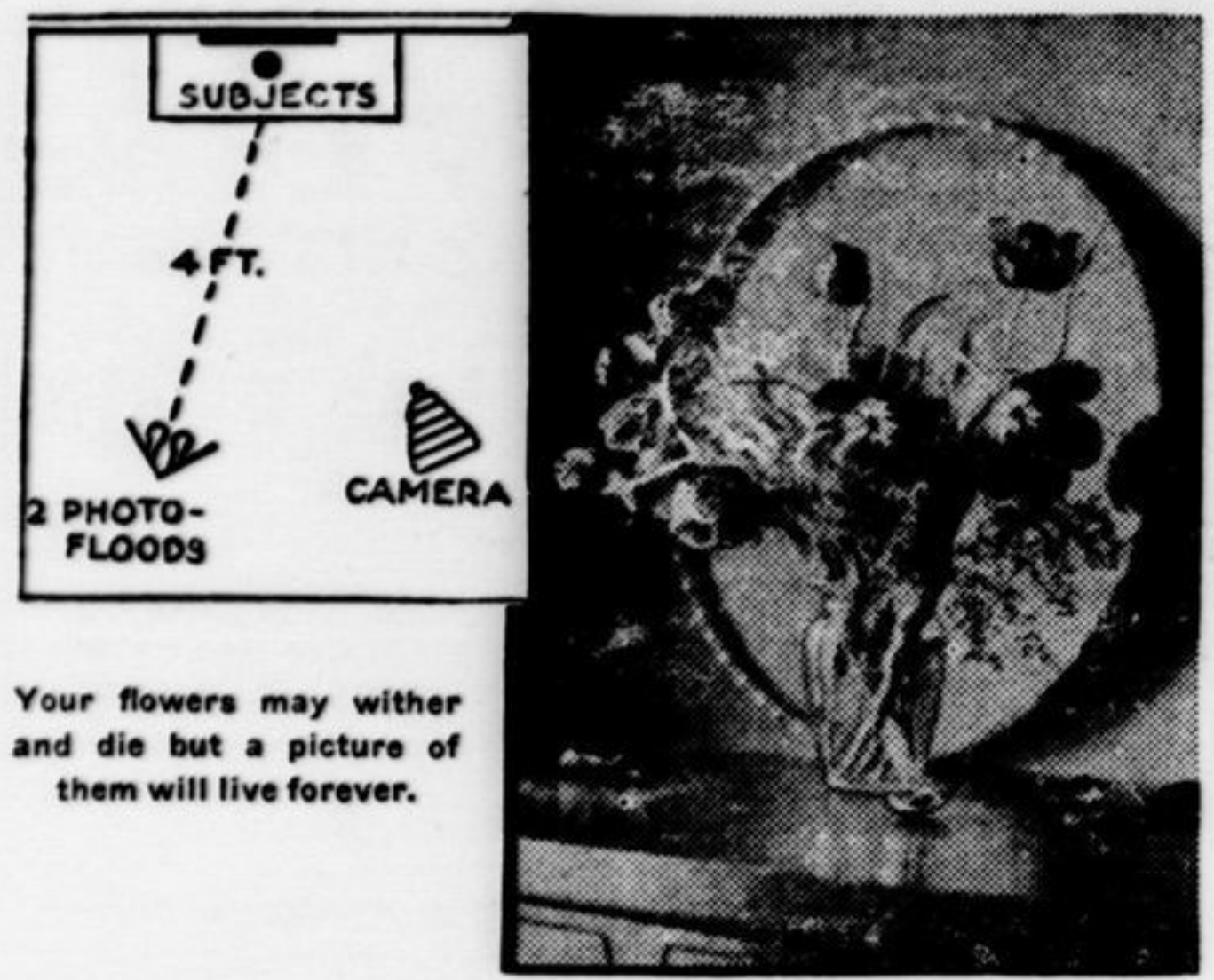


The SNAPSHOT GUILD FLOWER PICTURES



Your flowers may wither and die but a picture of them will live forever.

Why not keep a record of their growth and beauty with snapshots? You can take good pictures of flowers with any camera in the house outdoors but today let's discuss pictures of flowers in the house.

the best results are obtained when lighting comes more from the sides so as to cast interesting, artistic shadows.

The diagram above shows how the picture to the right was taken. It is best not to place lights directly in front of the subject for in doing so you will generally fall to get depth in the picture.

As shown in the diagram, you will need two photoflood lamps placed in an ordinary floor lamp with the shade tilted slightly upward.
