Well-Known Normanby Resident Passes

JOHN MARSHALL
A pioneer of North-east Normanby, widely and favourably known throughout the district, Mr. John Marshall, died on Thursday morning last, after an illness of six months from arterio sclerosis, or hardening of the arteries. Had he lived until Saturday, the day of his burial, he would have attained his seventy-seventh birthday. For a number of years he has been ill for certain periods, at times seriously, but good vitality then restored his health to a considerable extent.

The deceased was born on lot 16, con. 3, Normanby, just across the road from his present home. He was the son of the late James Marshall and Jessie McIvrie. In 1894 he was wedded to Annie Calder, niece of the late Mr. and Mrs. John McCall of Mount Forest, and they took up homemaking on the farm north of the present, now occupied by their son Andrew. To them were born a family of three sons and a daughter. James McCall, Andrew Calder, Robert John and Mrs. E. Wilton (Neil). John now has the home farm and the other are on neighboring farms. There are eight grandchildren. Besides the bereaved wife and family, there also mourn three sisters: Mrs. Ebenau (Jessie) of Laporte, Sask.; Mrs. Schrieber (Lizzie) of Mount Forest; Miss Annie, at home. Three brothers and one sister are deceased.

The late Mr. Marshall was a quiet man, devoted to his family and friends, and a successful farmer. He loved his home and neighborhood, and was never desirous of public life, though so well known.

He was one of the pillars of Knox Church Normanby, all his life being a member and worker in the church. One of the first children to be baptized there, he early joined the church and served on its Managing Board. For several years he taught in the Sunday School; forty years ago he was elected an elder of the church and has since been in the Session. He was an ardent supporter of the Missions of the Church, and in recent years has given five life memberships in the W. M. S. to his wife and other relatives.

The funeral service on Saturday afternoon was very largely attended by his pastor Rev. Robt. Honeyman, now of Durham conducting the service, Rev. M. G. Court of Holstein, read the scripture. Interment took place in Maplewood cemetery, the pallbearers being Messrs. Don McIvrie, R. R. Watson, William J. Allan, Andrew Marshall, David Marshall, Albert Marshall.
