**ROYAL FAIR TRIP**  
 Although many have intimated that they would like to go on the Royal Fair Trip, only a small number have really stated definitely they will go. The result has been that the plans have not been completed, as it is useless to make arrangements unless at least one hundred are going. A smaller number would mean NO trip would be made.  
 At time of writing however a most favourable train rate—considerably less than anticipated—has been offered. It was hoped that a number could be secured from every station in Grey County.  
 Special train or bus rates; Special hotel rates and other concessions are assured if one hundred or more will attend. This will reduce the total cost considerably.  
 The dates for the Grey County visit is to be Monday, Nov. 22nd and Tuesday, Nov. 23rd, if a sufficient number wish to attend the Fair.  
 To those who may not understand why a definite number is required, permit it to be said that the rates charged depend entirely upon numbers.
