It was a splendid service, presided over by the Moderator, Rev. J. R. Waldie, of Arthur. Rev. Mr. Killam, Drayton, gave the charge to the people; Rev. Dr. Howard of Palmerston to the minister; and Rev. M. G. Court, Holstein, preached the sermon. Rev. R. Honeyman put the usual question to the new pastor and had him sign. The choir had special music in solos and anthem.

Three other town pastors, Revs. Smith, Priest and Farr, were also present. Rev. Mr. Halbert was unable to come through illness.

Many friends here regret to learn of the misfortune of Mr and Mrs Dan McGrath of Williamsford in having house and contents totally destroyed by fire on Monday morning. It started about 6.30 a.m. after Dan had arisen and lit the fire, then went to the barn to do morning chores. Igniting from the chimney, the house was quickly in flames. Mrs. McGrath and little son Maurice, aged seven, and Mr. Campbell McLean, school teacher, who boards with the family, had little difficulty in escaping from the house, but upon returning to save some clothes and other effects, were almost trapped in the flames. Had they not tried to quell the flames, more could have been saved. The strong wind made their task a hopeless one, and with only a few articles saved, the house and entire contents were soon in ashes. The house was near Williamsford school, in the north end of the village.
