

Ingredients 1/2 lb. Bread Crumbs, 1/2 lb. Beef Suet 2 oz. Flour, 1/2 fb. Brown Sugar, 2 oz. Mixed Peel, Pinch Salt, 1/4 teaspoon Baking soda, Grated Rind and Juice of half of a Lemon, 1/4 pt. Milk, 3Eggs, 1/4 lb. Sultanas, 1/4 lb. Raisins, quarter 16 Currants, 1/4 oz. Cinnamon, 1/4 oz. Nutmeg, 1/4 oz. Allspice, 1-1/2 oz. Brandy.

Procedure

Mix the dry ingredients together thoroughly, then add the beaten eggs, milk and brandy, and mix all together thoroughtly. Grease inside of pudding thoroughly. Grease inside of pudding ding from sticking. If pudding bowl used, cover bowl with floured gauze tied tighly around bowl to keep moisture away from pudding. Boil pudding for three hours. Heat thoroughly before serving, then unmould on dish. Serve with sprig of holly on top. Serve with either Hard or Custard Sauce, made as follows:-
