WILLIAM CARSON

Aftering for over a year with a heart affection, a well-known Normanby resident, William Carson, of Knox Corners, passed to the Great Beyond on Wednesday morning. An attack of pneumonia the last two or three days hastened the end. The deceased was 71 years, 8 months of age, the son of the late Mr and Mrs Samuel Carson. He was born on the old Carson homestead on the sideroad east of Knox Corners and here he lived most of his life. He was away for short intervals, and in late years he and Mrs. Carson have lived on the adjoining farm to the south, his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Knisley occupying the old home.

Of a family of eleven, seven sons and four daughters, only one of his brothers George, now living in Buffalo, survives. The deceased was twice wedded, his first wife (nee Eliza Siris) dying thirty-two years ago. A daughter, Reto, Mrs. Wm. Knisley, Normanby; a son, Norman of Huntsville; and an adopted daughter, Mrs. Wm. Lewis of 2nd con. Normanby, survive. There are five grandchildren. Twenty-nine years ago he married Miss Jane Marshall, who also survives him, and has been a devoted wife and nurse.

The funeral service will be held from his late residence on Saturday, Dec. 18th at 2.30 p.m., interment to be made in Maplewood cemetery.

MRS. ANGUS MCKELVIE

The grim messenger, Death, brought sorrow to the home of Angus McKelvie, New Liskeard, on Wednesday, Dec. 9th, when the wife and mother passed away. It was known for some time back that her health was not rugged and when the patient suffered an attack of pleurisy, there was little or no resistance left to fight her final illness. Funny, it pays these big fellows to advertise and allows them to grow larger and larger, and the lack of advertising allows the local dealer to grow smaller and smaller."

ZERO WEATHER PREVAILS

"IT'S COLD AND WE KNOW IT"

With the snow and blizzards that have been Ontario's early Christmas box, there has accompanied it weather of zero variety, that was scarcely looked for so early in the season. It has caught many unprepared and resulted in considerable hardship. It of course has not frozen up the oil in any watch pocket, as it did to a Walkerton citizen's watch three winters ago when the mercury dipped to 53 below zero. But despite this fact it is cold and we know it. 12 below on Monday morning was the coldest recorded here, though Hanover claims it was 22 below there, and Swinton Park 28.

At the election in Walkerton on Monday, a vote was taken as to whether or not that the town should spend \$5,000 to purchase the idle Knechtel plant there, and the move was endorsed, 344 votes to 77, for a majority of 257. It had been intimated that if the town did not take over the factory, Knechtels Limited of Hanover would sell it to the wreckers rather than continue an annual expense of over \$1,000 in maintaining the factory, which they do not figure on ever operating again.
