TIME MARCHES ON

Recently in cleaning up an old attic, a bundle of newspapers was found, brown with age. Amongst them was a copy of "The Buffalo Illustrated Express" of July 13th, 1901, in which under the caption "Some Toronto Ghosts" an interesting article appears. It is headed "Toronto Hospitals for Consumption Patients" and is evidently a press despatch from Toronto reading: "In a very short time a large hospital for the treatment of consumption patients will be established. It goes on to state that the selection of a site was causing much difficulty; that the proposal of a consumption hospital came from half a dozen city physicians, some of whom were willing to donate their services free of charge because of the great need of having some place for those suffering from the White Plague, without travelling far from Toronto. With the approval of the then Provincial Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Bryce, it was proposed to have nearly a dozen tents, some for cooking, others for sleeping, and the first of such tents were to be hoisted from the Militia Department. This proposal was made just three years before the Toronto Hospital for Consumption was established and doubtless was instigated by a marked change in the opinion as to the curability of tuberculosis. Forced by the success achieved at the little hospital in Muskoka which had been erected by the National Association some eight years earlier, the first hospital for the treatment of tuberculosis in Canada. Looking back to those early days when patients were housed in tents or canvas, open front wooden shacks, tending their own fires, helping with the preparation of food, carrying water from a central pump, and other chores, one is tempted to think that the cure was almost worse than the disease. What an evolution there has been! Take the Muskoka and Toronto Hospitals for Consumption and the Queen Mary Hospital for Consumptive Children as models of present day sanatoria, with their great buildings scientifically equipped and adequately staffed, where skilled medical and surgical treatment may be given, accompanied by expert nursing care. Of course, such service is costly and these hospitals must have help in caring for the tuberculous poor. That is why you are asked to contribute. OVER FORTY YEARS SINCE FIRST IN COUNCIL

Re-elected as one of Durham's 1928 Council by acclamation Tuesday, Mr. George McKechnie has a unique record of municipal service. It was in January 1896 - forty-two years ago - that he was first elected to Durham Council, and he is the only member of that year's Council living - or of any Council up to 1902, at which time the present bailiff, Mr. Wm. Sharpe, enforced Durham Council for three years. Mr. McKechnie served as Councillor in 1898, 1897, 1898, then dropped out until the year 1913. In 1917 and 1918 he was again at the Board, then in 1919 was elected Mayor of the town. In 1923 he made another comeback to the Council Board, for his longest continuous term of office, - 1923, 1924, '25 '26 '27 and now '28. Possessing an alert mind and keen memory Mr. McKechnie, though now well up in his seventies, is a valued member at the Council table, with his years of experience in municipal problems, and his sound judgment on all debatable questions.

CANADIAN PAINT

Water and smoke did great damage to the church decorations, however, and these, with the floor will require to be entirely replaced.
