There was no stir or interest in the opening session Monday of Durham Council for 1938. Not one ratepayer came especially to hear the proceedings and the meeting passed off harmoniously and quietly.

There are two new faces — Mayor Allen Bell and Councilor Geo. MacKay. Both have sat at the table previously — Mr. Bell as Councilor and Reeve for ten years until five years ago, and Mr. MacKay as Councilor in 1916.

Rev. J. T. Priest gave the opening prayer, and Mayor Bell delivered an inaugural address. He hoped for a successful and harmonious year together and intimated that he would personally and in his official position do his best to put a stop to the bootlegging in and Durham, which is debauching our boys, yes our girls also; and have the officials enforce the law.

On behalf of other members and himself Coun. Duffield welcomed Mayor Bell and Coun. MacKay, the new members, to which the mayor voiced his thanks.

Accounts totalling \$334.56 were passed, also \$1000 for new fire truck, \$2437.50 for half of County rate, and \$129.92 December relief accounts.
