# **Bullets Open**

Drilling oil wells by shooting bullets into the ground is a new process for mining oil pools. It has been developed in order to reach beyond areas tapped by ordinary drilling methods, creating small lateral shafts, like the horizontal shafts that branch out from the main vertical shaft in

heavy expense. Since careful records are kept of everything through which a well passes, it is known at what levels the oil sands exist. By lowering a gun into the well and shooting holes in the casing a channel is made by which the oil can flow into the well. The gun is about ten feet long and has fifteen barrels through each of which a bullet is discharged.
