THE ROLL CALL

WM. A. LIVINGSTON

Ill since he suffered a stroke four
years ago, William Andrew Living-
ston, a widely-known Bentinck farm-
er, died early Tuesday morning at
his home in Hanover. Further strokes
about a year ago, since left him an
invalid.

Deceased was in his 74th year, the
son of the late Mr and Mrs Andrew
Livingston, and was born in 1864 in
the large stone house on the Durham
Road at Livingston's corner, Bentinck.
Forty-nine years ago he wedded Miss
Isabel Brigham of Allan Park, and
they took up farming across the road
from the old homestead. Here they
lived until eleven years ago, when
they retired and removed to Hanover.

The immediate family left to mourn
are his wife, three sons and two daugh-
ters: Wilfred Livingston of Mat-
tawa; Stanley of London; Brigham of
New York city; and Misses Rhena
and Ora of Hamilton; also seven
grandchildren. In addition to these
he leaves three brothers: James Liv-
ingston of Stratford, Frank and Her-
bert of Toronto, and two sisters, Mrs
Henry Richmond of Winnipeg and
May of Detroit.

The deceased was of a congenial
temperament, and was active in the
life of his home community. He was
fond of reading, and was well versed
on all public questions and events. He
was a Conservative in politics, and a
member of the United Church. The
funeral service is to be held Thurs-
day afternoon, from his late resi-
dence in Hanover, and interment will
be made in Durham cemetery.

ALLEN C. MAITLAND

As the result of a gun-shot wound
in the head, the bullet entering at
side of eye, Allen C. Maitland was
found dead in his home in Owen
Sound last Saturday afternoon. He
was known as a keen sportsman,
and was thought to have been taking
one of his gun from its case, when
in some manner, the trigger became
caught in the casing, firing a car-
tridge unknowingly left in the breach
of the rifle. He was caretaker at
Ryerson school and his wife, who
was across the road at the school
at the time, returned home and dis-
covered the lifeless body of her hus-
band. After investigation, it was de-
cided an inquest was unnecessary,
death being held accidental.

Deceased was 46 years old, a son
of the late Allan Maitland and Mrs.
Maitland, who lived in Durham for a
few years, removing to Owen Sound
some 25 or 30 years ago. His wife,
mother, one brother, Deane of Ingersoll
and one sister, Mrs. Fred Ruther-
ford, wife of the County Clerk,
survive him.

The funeral was held to Owen
Sound cemetery on Monday after-
noon. Mr. John and Misses Mary
and Kate McFayden, Glenelg, at-
tended the funeral.

SOUTH GREY W. I.

EXECUTIVE MEET

The executive of the South Grey
District Women's Institute was held
in the home of Mrs. Geo. Sharp, the
district secretary, Mrs. E. Halliday
of Glen Eden, presided. The district
annual meeting will be held in Dur-
ham on June 15th. The speakers will
be Mrs. C. Hayes, Georgetown, on
"Home Economics"; Miss Flora Dur-
bin, of Duncannon, the junior coach;
Mrs. H. Wilkinson, Federation di-
rector for Grey and Dufferin.

Grey will Expend over
\$100,000 on Co. Roads

County Roads expenditures for
1938 will run to an estimated \$113-
840, County Roads Committee chair-
man Thomas H. Randle reported to
the County Council at the first meet-
ing of its two-day April session
Wednesday morning.

Capital expenditures in the esti-
mates include \$13,500 for the pur-
chase of two power graders. The
committee, Mr. Randle explained,
had taken on their own shoulders to
purchase one grader, a new Diesel-
powered machine, because it was re-
quired immediately and otherwise
would have been required to wait
until the end of the April session.
Another grader, to be purchased, is
a heavy-power machine with leaping
front wheels, tandem-drive, Diesel
62 H. P. engine, costing \$7,554. It
will be used as a construction unit
over the whole county.

Mr. Randle explained that the
graders could be used by the town-
ships at any time at a low cost to
the townships. Last year the price
was \$11.75 an hour for operator and
grader.

Engineer McKnight said that no
township has enough work to keep
a power grader, and felt that each
township could use the extra grader
for at least 10 days each year and
the cost to the townships would be
very little.

The grader, of course must be
available for some work on County
roads, the engineer said. What work
is done on township roads is strictly
up to township officials, he said.
There is not likely to be much
change in costs to the townships,
said the engineer. The grader will
be rented at practically cost. He urged
townships to get in their requisitions
for use of the grader early so that a
schedule can be arranged. This will
mean lower costs to the townships.

New roads added to County Roads
System at the January session have
been approved by the Department of
Highways, the report said. The com-
mittee had inspected most of the
roads in the system, including the
new additions and "we found all the
roads in very fair conditions, al-
though there were indications that
there had been soft spots earlier in
the season. The patrolmen have re-
paired these soft spots satisfactorily
and no more trouble from frost
heaving is anticipated.

Wages for employees were set as
follows: Patrolmen \$4 per day and
find own transportation; grader
operators, 45 to 50 cents per hour,
they to find their own transporta-
tion; laborers 25 cts. per hour; man
and team, 50 cents per hour.

The committee proposed to apply
approximately the same quantity of
calcium chloride as last year. Under
a previous committee report the
County is to be given a 60-foot right-
of-way on all roads added to the
County System.

County Council Refuses
Grant to Music Festival

Grey County Council concluded its
brief two-day session Thursday after-
noon as it disposed of a number of
delegations, passed last-minute resolu-
tions before adjournment.

The request of the Grey County
Music Festival, as represented by
Mr. John Cowie and Mr. T. S. Cooper
Markdale, for support financially was
turned down. The delegation asked
only a guarantee, but a motion for a
\$100 grant was rejected.

A committee composed of Warden
McCauley, Reeves William Riley of
Meaford, D. J. McDonald of Ben-
tineck, Emerson Brown of Colling-
wood and W. S. Hunter of Durham,
was named to wait on Premier Hep-
burn re the attitude of the County
Council on the Legislature's propo-
sal to abolish county councils, pro-
viding such a step is necessary.

This resolution followed the re-
port of the Warden's Committee by
Chairman Albert Rusk which agreed
with the Warden's declaration that
opposition should be given the Leg-
islature in any move to abolish
county councils.

The Warden's Committee also au-
thorized a committee to look into
the matter of providing a proper fly-
ing system for Clerk F. Rutherford's
office. Warden McCauley mentioned
this in his address, pointing to the
fact that the flying system is
wholly inadequate and, in the inter-
ests of efficiency should be modern-
ized and brought completely up to
date.
