Glenelg Council

Met on April 2nd. All the members present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and passed. A communication was read from Dept of Highways with summarized statement of expenditures made on Township roads in 1937. The total subsidy due the Township from Department at 50 per cent. of amount expended amounts to \$4,597.21. The treasurer reported that he had received cheque for this amount. Applications for treasurer's bond were received from Western Assurance Co., and General Assurance Co. of those land on which options were held could not be purchased because the owners would not deal or could ward the insurance for a three year term: premium \$60.

Relief acc'ts were passed and payments made as follows: Mrs. R. Mortley, milk \$2.79; To Rocky Stone, groceries \$20.86; C. B. Lawrence, groceries and flour, \$19.75; L. T. Chapman, flour \$6.30; M. D. McFarlane, milk \$4.95; 2 bags of potatoes \$1.00; Fred Eagles 4 bags of potatoes \$2.00.

The following accounts were paid: Wm. Banks, for 1 1/2 cords of 20 inch wood for Tp. Hall \$4.50; Clerk salary \$25.00; County Treasurer balance of County Rate levied in 1937, \$4525.00; Bank of Montreal collection charges \$3.65; W. A. Lindsay, services as School Attendance

Officer in 1937, \$1.50; The Reeve, 1/2 day re road \$1.25; The Road Supt. presented pay sheet No. 4 for work on roads for amount of \$95.55. This was passed and payments made accordingly.

Timmins — O'Neil: That Live Stock Valuers be paid \$150 for each inspection. Carried.

Whitmore — Crutchley: That this Council set the price to be paid for gravel as follows: From 1 to 50 yards, 10 cents per yard. Over 50 yards, 8 cents per yard and for crushed gravel, 4 cents per yd. Carried.

Crutchley — Timmins: That the treasurer be authorized to accept from the treasurer of Bentinck Tp. the sum of \$20.81 re relief refund. Carried.

The treas. was authorized to erase from his books arrears of taxes to the amount \$72.84.

By-law No. 835 was passed appointing Poundkeepers as follows: Jas. Ellison, Hugh Wright, J. A. Beaton, H. Eckhardt, Wes. Arnett, Fenceviewers: J. G. Firth, W. B. Patterson, D. Smellie, Wm. McLeod, J. By-laws Nos. 836, confirming appointment of W. E. Harris as Tp. Solicitor, and 837, confirming appointment of W. J. Ritchie as Collector were also passed.

400 Acres More for Reforestation in Glenelg

The Reforestation Committee of the Grey County Council yesterday recommended that options be taken on a further 400 acres of woodland bringing up the total territory of the Grey County Forest to more than 1,000 acres. The cost of the additional property will be \$1,750.

The property on which options are now held and which are recommended for purchase are: Lot 23, Concession 8, Glenelg, 100 acres, owner, Murdoch O'Healey, \$500; Lot 24 Concession 8, Glenelg, 100 acres, owner, Department of Lands and Forests \$400; Lot 25 Concession 8, Township of Glenelg, \$400, owner, N. G. Campbell; Lot 26, Concession, 8 Glenelg township, 100 acres, owner, Department of Lands and Forests \$400.

The reports as presented to the Council Thursday afternoon did not pass without some discussion by the Council and it was agreed by some that possibly the county had acted a trifle hastily in going into the county forest business.

Warden H. A. McCauley said he had not understood that the proposition was going to be as expensive as he now believed it would be. It was pointed out to him, however, that there are three options to be taken by the county at the end of the \$0-year agreement. The Warden pointed out that the Province would appoint a caretaker pay him \$60 per month, give him free home, wood etc. and \$10 per month for a car or provide him with a horse. "It's an expensive proposition," he said, "for anything we get out of it at the end of 30 years."

Reeve McGregor of Sydenham, chairman of the Committee, declared it wasn't intended as a money-making scheme, but was for an educational purpose as well as following the general trend toward reforestation throughout Ontario.

Said Reeve Lockhart, "I think it's a dead horse."

"There are lots of things we spend money on that we don't get a return on," retorted Reeve McDonald of Bentinck, in support of the forest. "This land isn't particularly good for cultivation and is better if planted with trees."

Further explaining the purchases already made the Chairman pointed out that his committee felt all land bought was a good buy. Some of those land on which options were held could not be purchased because the owners would not deal or could ward the insurance for a three year term: premium \$60.

At this point Reeve John McGirr of Glenelg said that a school section was "kicking" because no taxes could be collected from the forest property. "We understood it was taxable," he declared. He went on to say that the property would require two caretakers because it was so widely separated. "Further," he said "if there are caretakers to be appointed the township should appoint them."

"One caretaker is enough," replied Chairman McGregor. "The job requires a man who knows his business and not any Tom, Dick or Harry the township might see fit to
