Such statements as this absolutely contradict any theory that makes the death of Christ an unexknew it would take place, and, had he chosen, he could have avoided such a death on the cross. Inasmuch as this predicition was most wonderfully fulfilled just when Jesus said it would be, we cannot escape the conclusion that he was what he claimed to be, and that he rose from the dead because God was satisfied with his work on the cross, and his own holiness prevented him from remaining in the power of death.



Finless Salmon Capture Dollar

Lucky Anglers Can Collect \$1.90 If They Catch One

Thousands of Atlantic salmon are swimming in Maritime waters marked with a price tag of one dollar each. The Dominion Government will pay the dollar to anyone catching them. 's part of a scientific plan to gath er accurate data on the migration of salmon, their travel routes and other

characteristics. The salmon were liberated by Dominion hatcheries in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia streams as fingerlin . Each had certain fins missing -a painless operation, so the Department of Fisheries says. Different sets of fins were snipped off, some fish losing the adipose or back fin and the right pectoral, or the fin from the right side of the body. Other fingerlings lost the adipose and left pectoral and still others, one of the ventrals, the fins on the underside of the body.

Whenever a fisherman catches one of the finless salmon, he may collect his dollar by telling how and where he landed it and sending to the Dopartment of Fisheries about three

dozen scales from the left middle side of the fish and enough skin to show the scars left by removal of the fins The department hopes to gather specific information on three points -the area frequented by salmon when they go to sea from different streams in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, what proportion of salmon return to the same stream when they come back from the sea and what pro portion of salm a from a river where
